Executive Summary

1. The present study on Mid Day Meal Scheme in Rajasthan, forms part of the SSA Monitoring carried out by the Institute of Development Studies, Jaipur (MI). Three Districts Barmer, Rajsamand and Sirohi were selected for this quarter. 40 schools and 1-2 Madarsas were selected randomly in each district. An effort was made to cover every block in the sample. Thus 120 elementary level schools and 3 Madarsas were selected for the study. Out of these schools- 9 were urban PS, 15 were urban UPS, 45 were rural P.S and 51 were rural UPS. There were no Special Training Centers functioning in the all four districts covered.
2. Out of 120 schools surveyed, cooking was being carried out in the school premises in 116 schools under the supervision of the SMC and in 4 schools MDM was being provided by Centralised Kitchen i.e. Akshay Patra Foundation. The MDM logo was not displayed in some of the schools and Madarsas surveyed and the teachers were not aware of the same.
3. Out of total schools surveyed, 88(73.3 percent) schools reported that the MDM was served regularly in the past 12 months. In 32 (26.7 percent) schools there was an interruption in serving of MDM. The average number of the days MDM was disrupted ranged from 5-90 days. District wise situation reveals that in Barmer district in 21 schools, 9 schools in Rajsamand and 2 schools in Sirohi districts the supply was interrupted due to irregular supply of food grain and non availability of cooking cost. The MDM is being supplied regularly in all the 3 Madarsas.
4. According to the MDM register, out of the total children enrolled, 59.6 percent children (60.2 percent boys and 58.9 percent girls) were availing MDM on the day of visit of the MI. The percentage is higher in Rajsamand followed by Sirohi and lowest in Barmer district. Gender wise data reveals a higher percentage of girls are availing MDM in Sirohi.
5. Out of the total enrolment, 58.6 percent children (58.5 percent boys and 58.7 percent girls) were physically present and were availing of MDM. Districtwise percentage of physically present children was found higher in Rajsamand (61.3 percent) and lower in Barmer (54.6 percent).
6. It was found that 86(71.7 percent) schools were receiving food grains on a regular basis. In 30(25 percent) schools the supply was irregular. In 65 percent schools reported that the food grain is delivered between one to three months, while 31.7 percent schools reported that it took more than three months for the food grain to be supplied. The food grain is supplied once in 3-4 months. Usually all the Madarsas had a stock of one month in reserve.
7. In 82(68.3 percent) schools reported that they had a buffer stock to deal with any situation of irregular supply, while the remaining stated that they do not keep a buffer stock. District wise position shows that number of schools not having buffer stock is higher in Barmer districts. With respect to the quality of food grain supplied, 2.5 percent teachers reported that the quality of food grain was good, whereas 84.2 percent teachers reported that it was average. 10 percent teachers articulated that the quality of food grain was poor. District wise situation reveals that quality of grains was found to be poor in Sirohi followed by Barmer districts.
8. 64 (53.4 percent) schools reported that they have been receiving cooking cost in advance while the remaining (43.3 percent) schools had not received cooking cost in advance. 31.6 percent schools reported a delay of 1 month to 4 months in receipt of cooking cost. In 11.7 schools there was a delay of more than four months in receiving

the cooking cost. If we look at the district wise delay in cooking cost, we find that highest number of schools in Barmer had not received cooking cost on time. In such situations the teachers often borrow cooking materials /spices from the neighboring shopkeepers. The main reason for delay in delivering cooking cost includes delays in transferring money from the district and block level into SMC account.

9. It has been observed that when the MDM is served children often sit according to their own preference, either with children from their own gender or caste affiliation. Gender based segregation is more evident in UPS. In 39.2 percent schools children were found to be sitting according to their own choice. In 49.2 percent schools children were found to sitting in line and taking MDM in an orderly manner. In 11.6 percent schools children were found to be in groups according to their sex. In 66.7 percent schools the MDM was being served by the cooks/helper. In 10 percent schools only girls were observed serving the MDM.
10. In 63.3 percent schools MDM was being prepared according to the pre- decided menu. In the remaining 36.7 percent schools food was not supplied as per Menu. Number of schools not supplying MDM as per prescribed Menu was higher in Rajsamand followed by Barmer district.
11. In 92.5 percent schools, children reported that they were satisfied with the quantity of MDM. Satisfaction level was found to be higher in Sirohi followed by Barmer district. 87.5 percent children expressed satisfaction with the quality of meal supplied. However in Sirohi district more children were not satisfied with the quality of meals provided. In all the Madaras the children expressed their satisfaction with the quality of MDM served.
12. 75.8 percent of the schools reported that the health check up is carried out once a year. 11 schools in Barmer have not conducted a health checkup during this session. In the surveyed schools it was found that 68.3 percent schools had maintained a health register. In majority of schools Iron Folic Acid Vitamins are not given regularly. In the Madaras covered in Sirohi and Barmer, no healthcheck up had been carried out and health cards were not available.
13. Out of 120 schools surveyed cooking was being carried out in the school premises in 116 schools and in 4 schools MDM have been provided by Centralised Kitchen i.e. Akshay Patra. In the 116 schools where cooking was being carried out in the school premises, there were 200 cooks (198 women and 22 men) appointed. 99 percent are women cooks. The caste composition is as follows: 6.5 percent women belong to SC groups. 15 percent women belong to ST group, about 62 percent women and 1.0 percent men belong to OBC groups. 12 percent women belong to forward caste groups and 3.5 percent women belong to minority caste groups. There were no male cooks from SC, ST, General and minority groups. Caste wise situation reveals that highest number of women and men belong to OBC group. In the Madaras it was reported that there was a delay in releasing payment to the cooks.
14. In 89.2 percent schools there was a *pucca* kitchen shed. Out of 120 schools surveyed there are no kitchen sheds in 13 (10.8%) schools. Non availability of kitchen sheds was higher in Rajsamand district. In 70.8 percent schools storage facilities for food grains was available. This situation of non availability higher in Sirohi district. In 26.7 percent schools firewood was being used for cooking MDM while in 35.8 percent schools cooking gas was being used. In remaining 34.2 percent schools both sources were being used. The use of LPG was more in Rajsamand district. In 76.7 percent schools water was available for cooking cleaning and washing.

15. The participation of parents, VEC members and PRIs in monitoring and Supervision of MDM was reported in 35.8 percent schools. Roaster system was being maintained in only few schools.
16. Regular inspection of MDM was reported in only 35.8 percent schools. The DPO had also not carried out any inspection in 80 percent of the schools. No inspection of MDM has been carried out by the SPMU.
17. 36.7 percent schools teachers reported that the MDM had helped in improving the enrollment. 58.3 percent school teachers expressed that MDM had also helped in improving the attendance of children in schools. It had also helped in improving the general nutritional levels of children. The teachers in 69.2 percent schools reported that MDM had led to minimizing caste and gender divisions.

Consolidated Report

Mid Day Meal Scheme in Rajasthan

Introduction

The Mid day meal (MDM) scheme is being implemented in all 33 districts of Rajasthan since the year 2002. A cooked meal is being served to all children studying in Std. I-VIII in consonance with Supreme Court directives. As part of the SSA monitoring, the MDM scheme was covered in the following districts: Barmer, Rajsamand and Sirohi.

General Information of Surveyed Schools

An effort was made to cover every block in the sample. 40 schools were selected in the each district. 2 Madarsas in Barmer district and one Madarsa in Sirohi were selected randomly. Thus a total of 120 elementary level schools were selected for the study. Out of these schools- 9 were urban PS, 15 were urban UPS, 45 were rural P.S and 51 were rural UPS.

(1) Regularity in serving meal at school level

Out of the total 120 schools surveyed, the MDM was being served in 108 schools on the day of the visit of the MI. In 12 schools MDM was not being served due to lack grains and non availability of cooks. In 116 schools MDM was being cooked in the school premises under the supervision of the SMC and in four schools of block Khemnora (Rajsamand) MDM was being served by Akshaypatra. See Table 2 and 3.

Interruption in MDM (Last twelve months)

Out of total schools surveyed, 73.3 percent schools reported that the MDM was served regularly in the past 12 months. In 26.7 percent schools there was an interruption in serving of MDM. The average number of the days MDM was disrupted ranged from 5-90 days. If we look district wise situation the interruption was reported higher in Barmer district. Table 4.

Reason for interruption in supplying MDM

Out of total 120 schools surveyed, 32 (26.7 percent) schools reported that there was interruption in supply of MDM. District wise situation reveals that in Barmer district the interruption was due to lack of supply of food grain in 21 schools and 9 schools in Rajsamand.. In Sirohi district 2 schools the MDM was interrupted due to non availability of cook. Table 6

(2) Trends (Enrollment, attendance and number of children actual availing MDM)

In the 120 schools surveyed the total enrollment was 11683 (5859 boys and 5824 girls). The sex ratio in total enrollment was 50.2 boys and 49.8 girls. District wise enrollment in the surveyed schools indicates that enrollment was higher in Barmer followed by sirohi. The ratio of girls in enrollment was also found to be higher in Barmer followed by Sirohi.

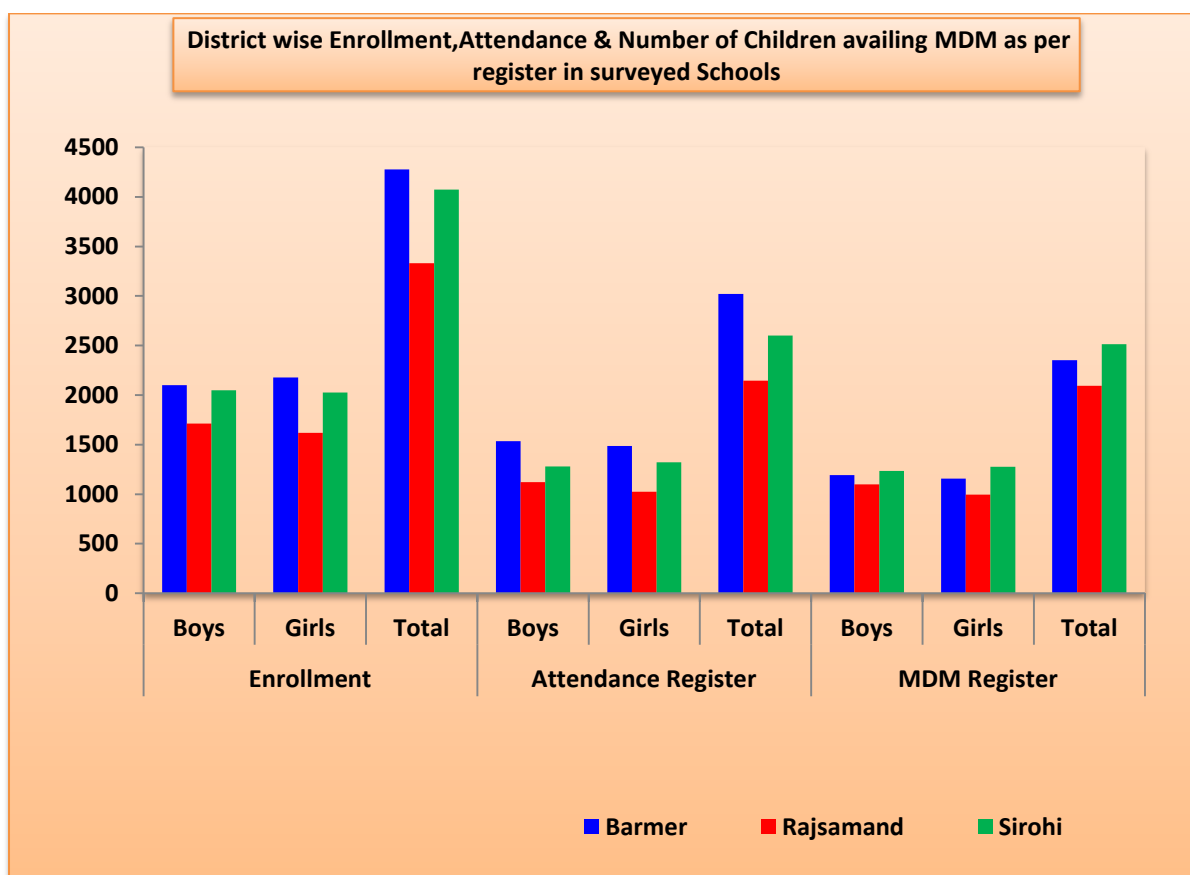
As per the attendance register, 66.5 percent children (67.2 percent boys and 65.8 percent girls) were present in the schools on the day of the visit of the MI. District wise data reveals that percentage of children's attendance was higher in Barmer and lower in Sirohi. The attendance of girls was higher in Barmer and district and lower in Rajsamand district.

According to the MDM register, out of the total children enrolled, 59.6 percent children (60.2 percent boys and 58.9 percent girls) were availing MDM on the day of visit of the MI. The percentage of children availing the MDM as per register was higher in Rajsamand followed by sirohi and lower in Barmer district. Gender wise data reveals a higher percentage of girls are availing MDM in Sirohi.

Out of the total enrolment, 58.6 percent children (58.5 percent boys and 58.7 percent girls) were physically present and were availing of MDM. Districtwise percentage of physically present children was found higher in Rajsamand (61.3 percent) and lower in Barmer (54.6 percent). Table 7

(3) Regularity in delivering food grains to school level

It was found that 71.7 percent schools were receiving food grains on a regular basis. In 25.0 percent schools the supply was irregular. In 65.0 percent schools reported that the food grain is delivered between one to three months, while 31.7 percent schools reported that it took more than three months for the food grain to be supplied. In 13.8 percent schools MDM was supplied by Centralised Kitchen.

While there was no delay in 65 percent schools, 16.7 percent schools reported that the primary reason for delay in delivery of food grain was due to delay at FCI level. In 6.7 percent schools the delay was due to lack of transport facilities and in 8.3 percent schools foodgrain was delayed due to lack of monitoring and not maintaining MDM records properly by MDM incharge. In case of such delay food grain was borrowed from neighboring schools. It was reported that the delay in supplying the food grains is generally 1-3 months. In 3.3 percent schools MDM was supplied by Centralised Kitchen. Table 8, 9, 10.

District wise position shows that number of schools not having buffer stock is higher in Barmer followed by Rajsamand districts. In 3.3 percent schools MDM was supplied by Centralised Kitchen. The food grain was supplied at the school level in 94 percent schools. Out of total schools receiving food grain at school level, 80.8 percent had received the specified quantity of food grain. However, 19.2 per cent schools reported that they did not receive the specified quantity. The variation ranged between 2-5 kg per bag.

With respect to the quality of food grain supplied, 2.5 percent teachers reported that the quality of food grain was good, whereas 84.2 percent teachers reported that it was average. 10 percent teachers articulated that the quality of food grain was poor. District wise situation reveals that quality of grains was found to be poorer in Sirohi followed by Barmer district Table 12.

53.4 percent schools reported that they have been receiving cooking cost in advance while the remaining (43.3 percent) schools had not received cooking cost in advance. 31.6 percent schools reported a delay of 1 month to 4 months in receipt of cooking cost. In 11.7 percent schools there was a delay of more than four months in receiving the cooking cost. If we look at the district wise situation, we find that highest number of schools in Barmer had not received cooking cost on time. In 3.3 percent schools MDM was supplied by Centralised Kitchen. The cooks are usually paid in cash and their honorarium has been increased to Rs. 1000. Majority of the cooks reported that the amount paid for cooking was not adequate, given the remuneration paid in the MNREGA and other development programs is higher.

(5) Social equity in MDM

It has been observed that when the MDM is served children often sit according to their own preference, either with children from their own gender or caste affiliation. Gender based segregation is more evident in UPS. In 39.2 percent schools children were found to be sitting according to their own choice. In 49.2 percent schools children were found to sitting in a line and taking MDM. In 11.6 percent schools children were found to be in groups according to

sex. In 66.7 percent schools the MDM was being served by the cooks/helper. In 10 percent schools only girls were observed serving the MDM. Table 15.

(6) Variety of Menu

A weekly menu for MDM has been specified by the State department. In 63.3 percent schools MDM was being prepared according to the prescribed menu. The number of schools not supplying MDM as per prescribed Menu was higher in Rajsamand followed by Barmer district. Table 16.

The weekly menu was seen displayed in 63.3 percent schools. In 17 schools in Barmer and 18 schools in Sirohi the weekly menu had not been displayed on the board.

Reasons for not following Menu

In 38 schools the MDM was not being prepared according to the prescribed menu. In 18 schools, fruits and green vegetables had not been given due to non availability of fruits and vegetables in the village. The high prices of fruits were another reason cited by the teachers in 7 schools. In 23.7 percent schools it was observed that the HM/MDM in charge was indifferent and did not make any effort to purchase the fruits or other items. Table 17.

(7) Quantity and Quality of MDM

In 85.8 percent schools children and their parents reported that the MDM scheme was beneficial. Higher benefits of MDM have been reported in Sirohi followed by Barmer district. In 92.5 percent schools, children reported that they were satisfied with the quantity of MDM. Satisfaction level was found to be higher in Sirohi followed by Barmer with regard to quantity. 87.5 percent children expressed satisfaction with the quality of meal supplied. 18.5 percent schools reported they were dissatisfied because of non-inclusion of fruits and green vegetables; 29.6 percent schools reported that grain was not cleaned properly, 22.3 percent schools reported that cleanliness is not maintained and meals are not cooked properly by the appointed cooks and so on. In majority of schools of all districts surveyed schools raised the issue of low quality and irregularity of cooking cost. Table18 and 19.

Some suggestions for improvement include- regular monitoring of MDM supplied by the schools, training on health and hygiene to MDM in charge and cooks and regular supervision by SMC members.

(8) Supplementary Nutrition

In 75.8 per cent schools, the school health program had been implemented by NRHM. Under this program a health check up is carried out of all the enrolled children by the health department. A health card is maintained and children are provided Iron, folic acid, vitamin -A dosage and de-worming medicines as per requirement. Majority of the schools reported that the health check is carried out once a year. Out of total surveyed schools no health checkup had been conducted in 24.2 percent schools in last 12 months. In 68.3 percent schools a health register had been maintained Table 20.

(9) Status of cooks

Out of 120 schools surveyed cooking was being carried out in the school premises in 116 schools and in 4 schools MDM have been provided by Centralised Kitchen i.e. Akshay Patra. Cooks and helper had been appointed in 116 percent schools as per requirement. The average remuneration paid to the cooks and helpers is Rs.1000- per month. Only in 70.6 percent schools the cooks had been paid their remuneration on a regular basis. In 29.4 percent schools there was a delay in payment of remuneration. The delay ranged from 3- 6 months. 82.8 percent schools reported that the cooks were paid in cash. In 17.2 percent school the payment was being made through a cheque. Table 22.

Caste and gender of cooks

In the 116 schools where cooking was being carried out in the school premises, there were 200 cooks (198 women and 2 men) had been appointed. Out of these 99 percent are women. The caste composition is as follows: 6.5 percent women belong to SC groups. 15 percent women belong to ST group, about 62 percent women and 1.0 percent men belong to OBC groups. 12 percent women belong to forward caste groups. 3.5 percent women belong to minority caste groups. There were no male cooks from SC, ST, General and minority groups. Caste wise situation reveals that highest number of women and men belong to OBC group. Out of total 200 cooks appointed in 116 surveyed schools, only in 62.9 percent schools cooks were given training. Table 23.23B

(10) Infrastructure facility for MDM scheme

Kitchen Sheds

In 89.2 percent schools there was a *pucca* kitchen shed. Out of 120 schools surveyed there were no kitchen sheds in 13(10.8%) schools. Out of these 13 schools in 4 schools the MDM was being supplied by Central KItchen, in 4 schools the meal was being cooked in open place or tin shed in the school premises. In 2 schools the the meal was being cooked at the residence of the cook and in 3 schools the meal was being cooked in the classroom. There are no Pucca kitchen sheds in 3 schools of Barmer, 6 schools of Rajsamand and 4 schools of

Sirohi district. The condition of doors of pucca kitchen sheds available in surveyed schools was average in 92.5 percent and poor in 7.5 percent schools. (12) Community Participation

Daily supervision of MDM

The participation of parents, SMDC members and PRIs in monthly monitoring and Supervision of MDM was reported in 35.8 percent schools. No contributions in cash have been made in the schools. Roaster system was being maintained in some schools.

Teachers and parents in majority of primary and upper primary schools reported that they were satisfied with quantity and quality of MDM served. Table 28.

In most schools parents were aware that MDM is being distributed to children, but they were not aware of the nutritional value of the MDM distributed to the children. The main source of information regarding MDM was the teacher and students.

Out of the surveyed 120 schools the frequency of SMC meetings was as follow: in 10 percent schools meetings were not organized, one to four times in 81.7 percent schools, 5-8 times in 8.3 percent schools and in 5 percent schools SMC meeting organized more than 9 times. In SMC meetings MDM related issue was not discussed in 33.3 percent schools in last 12 months, 1-3 times in 61.7 percent schools and in 5 percent schools MDM issue was discussed in SMC meetings. (14) Impact of MDM

In 36.7 percent schools teachers were of the view that the MDM had helped in improving the enrollment. 58.3 percent school teachers expressed that MDM had led to improvement in the attendance of children in schools; 72.5 percent teachers pointed that it had helped in improving the nutritional levels of children in schools. 69.2 percent teachers reported that MDM had also led to minimizing caste and gender differences. 46.7 percent school teachers felt that MDM had created

an educational environment in schools. The incidental benefits were reported in 31.7 percent schools and included regularity, the siblings who accompany the older children also benefit. Table 32.

Conclusion

In most of the schools surveyed, Midday meal was being distributed with fair regularity. Most teachers and parents reported that they were satisfied with the quantity and quality of MDM in the surveyed districts. The regularity of supply of food grains and quality related issues needs to be closely monitored. Emphasis also needs to be given to issues related to hygiene. In all schools of four districts greater monitoring in delivery of MDM is a felt need.

About 33 percent schools had received the specified quantity of food grain. However, 67 per cent schools reported that they received lesser quantities than specified. The variation ranges between 2-5 kg per bag. The food grain was supplied at the school level in majority schools.

With respect to the quality of food grain supplied 2.5 percent teachers reported that the quality of food grain supplied was good, whereas 87.5 percent teachers reported that it's was average and 10 percent teachers articulated that the quality of food grain was poor. In 22(55 percent) schools MDM is being supplied by Centralised Kitchen (Akshay Patra)

E. Regularity in delivering cooking cost to school

37.5 percent schools reported that they have been receiving cooking cost in advance while the remaining 62.5 percent were not found to be receiving cooking cost in advance. Delay in receiving cooking cost ranged from 1 month to 5 months. In such situations the teachers often borrow cooking materials /spices from the neighboring shopkeepers. The main reason of delay in delivering cooking cost includes delays in transferring money from the district and block level into SMC account.

The cooks in 95 percent schools are usually paid in cash and their honorarium has been increased to Rs. 1000. Majority of the cooks reported that the amount paid for cooking was not adequate, given the remuneration paid in the MNREGA and other development programmes.

F. Social equity

In 45 percent schools it was observed that children sit anywhere according to their own choice for the MDM. In 37.5 Percent schools childrens sit in a line and in 17.5 percent schools children sit according to sex groups specially in UPS schools. No discriminatory pattern was observed with regard to serving of MDM. All caste group children, both boys and girls were seen to be serving food in these schools. In 7.5 percent school the gender divide was clearly visible and girls were made to serve the food. In 60 percent schools the cook/helper was serving the MDM.

No overt discrimination related to religion caste and gender was observed in majority of the schools covered in the sample.

G. Variety of Menu

The State department has specified the weekly menu for MDM. In 67.5 percent schools MDM was being prepared according to the pre decided menu. In the schools the Menu was decided by the local SMC and State Government.

In 57.5 percent of the schools visited by the MI, the weekly menu was seen displayed in the school premises. The MDM logo was not displayed in 95 percent schools.

A variety is being ensured in most schools. Generally fruits, rice, dal and green vegetables have been included in the menu. However in 17.5 percent schools it was reported that fruits and green vegetables are not included in the menu. The reasons cited for not including these items in the menu are: non-availability of fruits and green vegetables in remote villages and high prices of fruits. In some cases it was observed that the MDM in charge is indifferent and does not purchase the fruits.

H. Quantity and Quality of MDM

In 97.5 percent schools parents reported that the MDM scheme was beneficial.

In 92.5 percent schools, children reported that they were satisfied with the quantity of MDM. 87.5 percent expressed satisfaction with the quality of meal supplied. In the remaining schools children expressed dissatisfaction with the MDM supplied. The reasons for not being satisfied include non-inclusion of fruits and green vegetables; grain was not cleaned properly and food not cooked properly.

I. Supplementary Nutrition

According to 72.5 percent schools, the school health programme is implemented by NRHM. Under this programme a health check up is carried out of all the enrolled children by the ANM. A health card is maintained and children are provided Iron, folic acid, vitamin -A dosage and de-worming medicines as per requirement. In the surveyed schools it was found that only 62.5 Percent schools had maintained a health register. Majority of the schools

reported that the health check is carried out once a year. In 27.5 percent schools, no health check up has been carried out.

In 65 percent schools it was reported that they had received the necessary nutrition supplements from NRHM. In 35 percent schools no supplements have been provided to the children.

Some suggestions include regular monitoring of health check up, maintenance of records of health check, follow up to be ensured.

J. Status of Cooks

In all 40 schools where cooking is being carried out in the school premises, the cooks have been appointed by the SMC. In all the surveyed schools cooks and helper were available as per requirement. The average remuneration paid to the cooks and helpers ranges from Rs.1000- Rs. 1200.

As per MDM norms the cooks are paid a remuneration of Rs. 1000. However in some cases where the required number of cooks has not been appointed the cooks/helper is paid more.

In only 29(72.5 percent) schools the cooks were paid their remuneration regularly. In the remaining schools there was a delay in payment of remuneration. The delay ranged from 3- 6 months.

All schools reported that the cooks were paid in cash

In the 40 school surveyed was MDM is supplied by SMC there were 81 cooks (80 women and one man) working in MDM. The caste composition was as follows: 9.8 percent women belongs to SC group, : 1.2 percent women belongs to ST group, 80.2 percent women and 1.2 percent men belonged to OBC groups, 2.5 percent women belonged to General caste and 4.9 percent women belongs to minority groups. There is no single man from SC, ST, general and minority caste groups working as cook.

K. Infrastructure

Kitchen Sheds

In all 40(45 percent of surveyed) schools where the MDM was being prepared in the school premises 92.5 percent schools had a *pucca* kitchen shed. In schools where there were no kitchen sheds meals were being cooked in the classrooms, at the residence of the cook or in the tin shed in the school premises.

The kitchen sheds had been constructed under various development programmes including SSA.

Storage Facility

In 30 (75 Percent) schools out of 40 schools surveyed storage facilities for food grains was available. In the remaining schools storage facility had been not sanctioned and in some it was under construction. In these schools food grain was being stored in the classrooms in gunny bags and drums.

Water

In 67.5 percent schools sufficient water was available for the purpose of cooking, drinking and washing.

Utensils

In majority schools (97.5 percent) schools utensils for cooking and serving were available.

Cooking Gas/fuel wood

In 30 (75 Percent) out of 18 schools surveyed cooking gas was being used for preparing MDM. In 7 schools firewood was being used for cooking MDM and in remaining 3 schools both was being used.

L. Safety and Hygiene

80 percent school teachers reported that safety measures were taken while cooking MDM. According to 77.5 percent teacher's hygiene practices were promoted in the schools and children washed their hands before and after meals. 70 percent teachers said that cleanliness is maintained in the schools.

However, in 10 percent schools, teachers reported that discipline was poor in the school during distribution of MDM. In majority schools measures were taken to conserve water while washing utensils.

M. Community Participation

The participation of parents, VEC members and PRIs in monitoring and Supervision of MDM was only reported in 50.0 percent schools. No contributions in cash have been made in the schools. In 9 percent schools roaster system was being maintained.. Teachers and parents in majority of primary and upper primary schools reported that they were satisfied with quantity and quality of MDM served. However in 10.0 percent schools teachers and parents stated that the quality of MDM was poor.

In most schools parents were aware that MDM is being distributed to children in schools but they were not aware of the nutritional value of the MDM distributed to the children. The main source of information regarding MDM was the teacher and students.

N. Inspection and Supervision

It was reported in 40 percent schools that there was a regular inspection of MDM. No inspection of MDM has been carried out by the SPMU. The DPO had also not carried out any inspection in 80.0 percent of schools. The BRC/CRC and other block officers carried out quarterly and half yearly inspection of the MDM.

O. Impact

According to 10.0 percent schools teachers the MDM had helped in improving the enrollment and attendance of children in schools. It had also helped in improving the general nutritional levels of children. The teachers in 70 percent schools reported that MDM had led to minimizing caste and gender divides and also created an educational environment in schools. The incidental benefits were reported in 37.5 percent schools and include regularity, the siblings who accompany the older children also benefit

MDM in Madarsas : District Barmer

There are a total of 338 Madarsas registered in district Barmer. There are a total of 359 para teachers working in the Madarsas. A total of 12724 boys and 10325 girls' total 23049 students are enrolled in these Madarsas. Out of total 338 Madarsas only 192 Madarsas are supplying MDM by government, remaining managing at their madarsa level.

Three Madarsas were covered during the Monitoring.

- Madaarsa Musarpha Vilayat Sahe Itanda
- Madarsa Shahide Karbala Itadia.

The MDM Logo was not displayed in all Madarsas and the menu was not displayed.

A total of 5275 children had availed MDM in the past one month. The MDM was being cooked in Madarsas premises.

Social Equity: It was observed that all the children were eating the MDM . Only girls were serving the MDM.

The MDM was served in accordance to the prescribed Menu. However, no fruits had been served to the children. Instead biscuits had been distributed once a week.

Quantity and Quality of MDM: Most parents and children were satisfied with the quantity and quality of food served. However teachers complained that the rotis were often hard and sometimes there were insects found in the food.

No health check up had been carried out in the Madarsas.

D. Regularity in delivering food grains to school

75 percent schools were receiving food grains on a regular basis. In the remaining 25 percent schools the supply was irregular. In 5 percent schools reported that the foodgrain is delivered within one month;97.3 percent schools reported that the foodgrain is delivered between one to three months, while 2.7 percent schools reported that it took more than three months for food grain to be supplied.

In case of such delays the food grain is borrowed from neighboring schools. 72.2 per cent schools reported that they had a buffer stock to deal with any situation of irregular supply. The remaining schools stated that they do not keep a buffer stock.

75.0 percent schools had received the specified quantity of foodgrain, whereas 25.0 percent reported that lesser quantities than specified. The variation ranges between 2-5 kg per bag.

The quality of food grain was reported to be good only in 2.7 percent schools whereas 88.9 percent teachers reported that it's was average, and in 8.3 percent schools teachers articulated that the quality of food grain was poor.

E. Regularity in delivering cooking cost to school

61 percent schools reported that they have been receiving cooking cost in advance while 39 percent were not found to be receiving cooking cost in advance. Delay in receiving cooking cost ranged from 1 month to 5 months. As in other districts, the teachers often tend to borrow cooking materials /spices from the neighboring shopkeepers. The main reason of delay in delivering cooking cost includes delays in transferring money from the district and block level into SMC account.

In 86 percent schools the cooks are paid in cash. In majority of the surveyed schools cooks complained that the amount paid for cooking was not adequate.

F. Social equity

In most schools it was observed that children were made to sit in a line (with or

without a dari patti) for the MDM (52.5 percent schools had this arrangement). In no any schools children were found to be sitting in groups according to their caste identity. In 12.5 percent schools children were sitting in gender groups specially in UPS schools.

In schools no discriminatory pattern was observed with regard to serving of MDM. All caste group children, both boys and girls were seen to be serving food in these schools. However in 12.5 percent school the gender divide was clearly visible and girls were made to serve the food. In 62.5 percent school the cook/helper was serving the MDM.

No overt discrimination related to religion caste and gender was observed in majority of the schools covered in the sample.

G. Variety of Menu

In all 77.5 percent schools MDM was being prepared according to the weekly menu decided by the State. In the remaining schools the Menu was decided by the local SMC.

In all the schools visited by the MI the MDM logo was not displayed in 95 percent school but in 22.5 percent of the schools the weekly menu was not displayed in the school premises. A variety is being ensured in most schools. Generally fruits, rice, dal and green vegetables have been included in the menu. However in 12.5 percent schools it was reported that fruits and green vegetables are not included in the menu. The reasons cited for not including these items in the menu are: non-availability of fruits and green vegetables in remote villages and high prices of fruits. In some cases it was observed that the MDM in charge is indifferent and does not purchase the fruits.

H. Quality and Quantity of MDM

In 80 percent schools children reported that the MDM scheme was good and beneficial.

In 90 percent schools children reported that they were satisfied with the quantity and in 90 percent schools were satisfied with quality of MDM supplied. In the remaining schools children expressed dissatisfaction with the

MDM supplied. The main reason was non-inclusion of fruits and green vegetables in menu.

Some suggestions for improvement include- regular supervision by SMC members, training on health and hygiene to MDM in charge.

I. Supplementary Nutrition

The school health programme implemented by SSA/NRHM is functioning in the district. 75 percent schools reported that it was being implemented in their schools. Under this programme a health check up is carried out of all the enrolled children by the ANM. A health card is maintained and children are provided Iron, folic acid, vitamin -A dosage and de-worming medicines as per requirement. In the surveyed schools it was found that only 65 percent schools had maintained a health register. Majority of the schools reported that the health check up is carried out on a yearly basis.

In 62.5 percent schools it was reported nutrition supplements had been provided to the children on a regular basis. In the remaining school the supply was irregular.

Some suggestions include: regular monitoring of health check up, maintenance of records of health check, follow up of children who are found with health problems/difficulties should be ensured.

J. Status of Cooks

In 40 surveyed schools in 36 schools where cooking is being carried out in the school premises, the cooks have been appointed by the SMC. In all surveyed schools cooks and helper were available as per requirement. The average remuneration paid to the cooks and helpers ranges from Rs.1000 per month. As per MDM norms the cooks are paid a remuneration of Rs. 1000. However in some cases where the required number of cooks has not been appointed the cooks/helper is paid more.

In only 58.3 percent schools the cooks were paid their remuneration regularly. In the remaining schools there was a delay in payment of remuneration. The delay ranged from 3- 6 months.

86.1 percent schools reported that the cooks were paid in cash.

In the 36 school surveyed was MDM is supplied by SMC there were 48cooks

(47 women and 1 men) working in MDM. The caste composition was as follows: 2. percent women belongs to SC group 2.0 percent women belong to ST and 72.9 percent women and 2.0 percent men belong to OBC groups. 20.8 percent women belong to General caste group. There is no single men is working as cook from SC ST, general and Minority caste groups.

K. Infrastructure

Kitchen Sheds

In 85 percent schools there were pucca kitchen sheds. In the remaining schools two situations prevailed either there were no kitchen sheds (6 schools) or the kitchen sheds were not usable.

The kitchen sheds had been constructed under various development schemes including SSA.

There should be an assessment of the construction of kitchen cum store. It was observed that due to poor quality of construction the kitchen cannot be used properly. About 8 percent kitchen sheds have no door, roof and floor properly.

Storage Facility

Storage facilities for food grains were available in 80 percent schools. In the remaining schools storage facility had been sanctioned and in some it was under construction. .

In these schools food grain was being stored in the classrooms or HM room in gunny bags.

Water

In 87.5 percent schools water was available for the purpose of cooking, drinking and washing. The sources included hand pump and tank.

Utensils

Utensils for cooking and serving were available in 95 percent schools.

Cooking Gas/fuelwood

In the 5 percent schools firewood is used for cooking MDM. In the 15 percent schools are using LP gas while 70 percent school among the surveyed schools are using both gas and firewood.

L. Safety and Hygiene

Only in 82.5 percent schools teachers reported that safety measures were taken while cooking MDM. Hygienic practices (like washing hands before meals) were reported in 80 percent schools. Cleanliness is not maintained properly in 27.5 percent schools. Teachers of 10 percent schools reported that discipline was poor in the school during distribution of MDM. In majority schools teachers reported that they took adequate measures to conserve water while washing utensils.

M. Community Participation

The participation of parents, VEC members and PRIs and monitoring and Supervision of MDM was reported only in majority of schools. Teachers and parents in majority of primary and upper primary schools reported that they were satisfied with quantity of MDM served. However in 75 percent schools teachers and parents stated that the quantity of MDM was poor.

The parents were however, not aware of the nutritional value of the MDM distributed to the children.

N. Inspection and Supervision

Regular inspection of MDM was reported in all the surveyed schools. No inspection of MDM has been carried out by the SPMU. The DPO had not visited 80 percent schools. The BRC/CRC and other block officers carried out quarterly inspection of the MDM in 32.5 percent schools

O. Impact

According to teachers in 37.5 percent schools the MDM had helped in improving the enrollment and 52.5 percent school teachers reported incensement in attendance of children in schools and 77.5 percent had also helped in improving the general nutritional levels of children. The teachers in only 72.5 percent schools reported that MDM had led to minimizing caste and gender divides. The incidental benefits were reported in 30 percent schools and include regularity, exposure of the siblings who accompany the older children to an educational environment.

Mid Day Meal supply by Central Kitchen: Akshya Patra Foundation

Out of total 40 schools surveyed in Rajsamand district, MDM in 4 schools of block Khamnor and Nathdwara city was being supplied by Central Kitchen-Akshya Patra. The AKSHYA PATRA Foundation is supplying MDM through its centralised kitchen located in Ganesh Tekari, Nathdwara since -----. The Centralised kitchen is located in Nathdwara and is spread over a large area. The surroundings are clean and it is easily accessible.

The foundation supplies MDM to 434 government primary schools,. The radius in which the MDM is supplied ranges around 2 km to 94 km.

The premises is spread in 2200 square metres where the MDM is prepared is clean and there is adequate space for storage of foodgrain and other raw material. Preparation is carried out in a 10x10 sq. feet room and there are both dry and wet areas where cooking is carried out. The assembling and packaging also takes place in specified areas. There is a separate washing area. All the rooms were observed to be clean.

The procurement and storage of food items is carried out on a regular basis food grain is purchased at one time. These are stored in jute and plastic gunny bags. 50 kg. Pulses and oil is procured every quarter; and vegetables is procured on a daily basis. All the raw ingredients are thoroughly cleaned and stored before usage. They are placed on the floor as there is no raised platform. The food items are cleaned thoroughly before preparation.

There is adequate supply of water through tap, availability and storage of water in the premises. .

The MDM is prepared auto machines and on LPG. The total time taken for preparing the food is around 4 hours. The time lapse between preparation and packing is around 1 hour. The chapattis are made by an automated machine. The food items are kept in stainless containers- dols and patilas and later transferred to tiffin carriers.

The MDM is prepared between 4 a.m to 8.a.m. and supplied to the various schools by 10a.m.

Though the total costs per child are around RS.8.50 the Foundation receives a sum of Rs. 3.50 paise per child. The food grain is supplied by the government at a subsidised rate of Rs. 2 per kg. The process of cleaning and preparing the flour is carried out by the Foundation.

The MDM supply to the schools by 22 Vans/Containers. The schools reported

D. Regularity in delivering food grains to school

It was found that 100.0 percent schools were receiving food grains on a regular basis.. In 62.5 percent schools reported that the food grain is delivered between one to three months, while 37.5 percent schools reported that it took more than three months for the food grain to be supplied. The primary reason for delay in delivery of food grain in schools was due to delay at FCI level and lack of transport facilities. In case of such delays the food grain was borrowed from neighboring schools. 87.5 percent schools reported that they had a buffer stock to deal with any situation of irregular supply while the remaining stated that they do not keep a buffer stock.

About 55 schools had received the specified quantity of food grain. However, 45 per cent schools reported that they received lesser quantities than specified. The variation ranges between 2-5 kg per bag. The food grain was supplied at the school level in majority schools.

With respect to the quality of food grain supplied teachers reported that it's was average.

E. Regularity in delivering cooking cost to school

67.5 percent schools reported that they have been receiving cooking cost in advance while the remaining 32.5 percent were not found to be receiving cooking cost in advance. Delay in receiving cooking cost ranged from 1 month to 5 months. In such situations the teachers often borrow cooking materials /spices from the neighboring shopkeepers. The main reason of delay in delivering cooking cost includes delays in transferring money from the district and block level into SMC account.

The 67.5 percent schools cooks are usually paid in cash and their honorarium has been increased to Rs. 1000. Majority of the cooks reported that the amount paid for cooking was not adequate, given the remuneration paid in the MNREGA and other development programmes.

F. Social equity

In 37.5 percent schools it was observed that children sat anywhere according to their own choice for the MDM. In 57.5 Percent schools children sit in line and take MDM in a disciplinary manner. No discriminatory pattern was

observed with regard to serving of MDM. All caste group children, both boys and girls were seen to be serving food in these schools. In 77.5 percent schools the cook/helper was serving the MDM.

No overt discrimination related to religion caste and gender was observed in majority of the schools covered in the sample.

G. Variety of Menu

The State department has specified the weekly menu for MDM. In 72.5 percent schools MDM was being prepared according to the pre decided menu. In the schools the Menu was decided by the local SMC.

In 55 percent of the schools visited by the MI, the weekly menu was seen displayed in the school premises. The MDM logo was not displayed in any school.

A variety is being ensured in most schools. Generally fruits, rice, dal and green vegetables have been included in the menu. However in 15 percent schools it was reported that fruits and green vegetables are not included in the menu. The reasons cited for not including these items in the menu are: non-availability of fruits and green vegetables in remote villages and high prices of fruits. In 7.5 percent schools it was observed that the MDM in charge is indifferent and does not purchase the fruits.

H. Quantity and Quality of MDM

In 90 percent schools parents reported that the MDM scheme was beneficial.

In all the schools, children reported that they were satisfied with the quantity of MDM. 85 percent expressed satisfaction with the quality of meal supplied. In the remaining schools children expressed dissatisfaction with the MDM supplied. The reasons for not being satisfied include non-inclusion of fruits and green vegetables; grain was not cleaned properly and food not cooked properly.

I. Supplementary Nutrition

According to 80 percent schools, the school health programme is implemented by NRHM. Under this programme a health check up is carried out of all the enrolled children by the ANM. A health card is maintained and children are provided Iron, folic acid, vitamin -A dosage and de-worming medicines as per requirement. In the surveyed schools it was found that only 77.5 Percent

schools had maintained a health register. Majority of the schools reported that the health check is carried out once a year. In 57.5 percent schools, no health check up has been carried out.

In 52.5 percent schools it was reported that they had received the necessary nutrition supplements from NRHM. In 47.5 percent schools no supplements have been provided to the children.

Some suggestions include regular monitoring of health check up, maintenance of records of health check, follow up to be ensured.

In most schools parents were aware that MDM is being distributed to children in schools but they were not aware of the nutritional value of the MDM distributed to the children. The main source of information regarding MDM was the teacher and students.

N. Inspection and Supervision

It was reported in 40 percent schools that there was a regular inspection of MDM. No inspection of MDM has been carried out by the SPMU. The DPO had also not carried out any inspection in 77.5 percent of schools. The BRC/CRC and other block officers carried out quarterly and half yearly inspection of the MDM.

O. Impact

According to 40 percent schools teachers the MDM had helped in improving the enrollment and attendance of children in schools. It had also helped in improving the general nutritional levels of children. The teachers in 65 percent schools reported that MDM had led to minimizing caste and gender divides and also created an educational environment in schools. The incidental benefits were reported in 27.5 percent schools and include regularity, the siblings who accompany the older children also benefitted.

MDM in Madarsas : District Sirohi:

MDM is being served in 28 Madarsas in Sirohi district. MDM is now being prepared and served in the 6 Madarsas. In remaining 22 madarsas MDM not being served because enrollement was below 20 students. In these Madarsas 501 boys and 536 girls' and total 1037 students are enrolled.

Two Madarsas were covered during the Monitoring visits.

The logo had not been displayed in any of the Two Madarsas. The teachers did not have the information about the logo.

All the Madarasas had displayed the menu.

All the Madarasas were serving the MDM on a regular basis but one Madarsa reported that there was a gap in serving MDM as they had run out of stock of food grains.

The MDM is cooked and served by a cook who has been appointed by the SMC.

The enrolment in the Madarasas is as follows.

Out of total enrolled about 58 percent children were present on the day of visit

All the Madarasas reported that the food grains were supplied on a regular basis and there was adequate stock available in the Madarasas. The disbursement of funds had also been regular.

There was no discrimination observed in the serving of MDM and the cook was observed distributing the MDM.

Both the children and community members were satisfied with the quality of MDM served.

No health check up had been carried out in the Madarasas in the current academic session.

No regular supervision has been carried out of the MDM by the SMC members or district officials.
