1. Introduction

Mid Day Meal Programme aims to supplement the initiative launched under SSA to universalize elementary education. It focuses on enhancing enrollment, retention, attendance and simultaneously improving nutritional levels among children, the National Programme of Nutritional Support to Primary Education (NP-NSPE) was launched as a Centrally Sponsored Scheme on 15th August 1995, initially in 2408 blocks in the country. By the year 1997-98 the NP-NSPE was introduced in all blocks of the country.

According to the programme the Government of India will provide grains free of cost and the States will provide the costs of other ingredients, salaries and infrastructure. Since most State governments were unwilling to commit budgetary resources they just passed on the grains from Government of India to the parents. This system was called provision of \div dry rations@ On November 28, 2001 the Supreme Court of India gave a landmark direction that made it mandatory for the state governments to provide cooked meals instead of \div dry rations@ The direction was to be implemented from June 2002. It was further extended in 2002 to cover not only children in classes I -V of Government, Government aided and local body schools, but also children studying in EGS and AIE centers.

There is also evidence to suggest that apart from enhancing school attendance and child nutrition, mid day meals have an important social value and foster equality. As children learn to sit together and share a common meal, one can expect some erosion of caste prejudices and class inequality. Moreover, cultural traditions and social structures often mean that girls are much more affected by hunger and malnutrition than boys. Thus the mid day meal programme can also reduce the gender gap in education and upbringing. In October 2007, the scheme has been further revised to cover children in upper primary (classes VI to VIII).It was initially begun in 3479 Educationally Backwards Blocks (EBBs). Since 2008-09, the programme covers all children studying in Government, Local Body and Government-aided primary and upper primary schools and the EGS/AIE centers including Madarsa and Maqtabs supported under SSA of all areas across the country.

The successful implementation of any programme is an essential core step for its success, a close and careful monitoring spread over the entire course of its implementation assures its effective and efficient enforcement. In MDM monitoring of programme implementation was assigned a special significance the revised NP-NSPE, 2004 scheme also provided for a 4-tier institutional mechanism for programme management, through the constitution of Steeringcum-Monitoring Committees at the National, State, District and Block levels. It is in this regard that GOI has sought collaboration with various reputed and well-established research and educational organizations of the country to act as Monitoring Institutions (MI) for MDM implementation.

The Centre for the Study Developing Societies (CSDS), a social science research institute of repute functioning under the aegis of the ICSSR (Indian Council of Social Science Research) was identified to act as one of the Monitoring Institutes for the National Capital Territory of Delhi.

This report summarizes the state of implementation and related activities of the MDM program undertaken by the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India for the period 1st April 2011 to 30th september 2011. The Centre for the Study of Developing Societies, (CSDS) Rajpur Road, Delhi as per the MOU with MHRD for the period of 1st October 2010 to 30th September 2012, is entrusted with the task of monitoring MDM programmes.

In the monitoring process the CSDS team focused on schools in the two districts: North West Delhi and West Delhi. The report is based on fieldwork, secondary data collected from state MDM Cell, i.e. Directorate of education, zonal office of MCD comprising interviews Principals/Headmasters, Midday Meal in-charge, students, parents and field observations. As per the new terms of reference the Monitoring institute (MI) shall also ensure that at least 40 schools shall cover from each district. The schools visited comprise three categories: Delhi Government schools, Municipal Corporation Schools, (MCD), and Government-aided schools. Delhi has the unique position of being a state (with out being a full- fledged state) as well as the capital territory of India. In 1956 it lost the status of State and become a union territory under the State Recognition Commission Act. In November 1993, however, it was again granted the status of a state. Elementary Education in Delhi is managed by different organizations and local bodies including Directorate of Education (DOE), MCD, NDMC, Delhi Cantonment Board (DCB) and privately managed educational societies.

The MCD run primary schools whereas the Directorate of Education, NDMC and Delhi Cantonment Board run schools for primary, upper primary, Secondary and senior secondary levels. There are several schools aided by Directorate of Education and other three local bodies in Delhi.

There is a two tier administrative set up for managing educational services. At the state level, the Department of Education manages education up to the senior secondary level through the Directorate of Education (DOE) in accordance with the provision of the Delhi School Education Act 1973.

The Administrator (the Lt. Governor) regulates education in all the schools in accordance with the Provisions of this Act. The DOE is meant for providing education up to higher secondary level in Delhi and is empowered to prescribe and supervise the standard of education in all the schools located in NCT of Delhi. The Director of Education as per the Delhi School Education Act, 1973 is the highest officer in charge at the Directorate and is accountable to the Secretary of Education, Delhi.

DOE has 11adminstrative Districts to manage DOE schools under its Jurisdiction. MCD is divided in 12 zones to manage Schools under its charge. The DOE districts and MCD zones are not co-terminus. The state of Delhi has a total of 9 Revenue Districts. SSA Implementation is on the basis of revenue Districts. At the sub-state level, there are three municipal bodies (local bodies), namely-

- 1. Municipal Corporation of Delhi (MCD)
- 2. New Delhi Municipal council (NDMC)
- 3. Delhi Cantonment Board (DCB)

Under this programme, nutritional support is provided to children of Directorate of education (DOE) MCD, NDMC, Delhi Cantonment Board (DCB), aided schools and RBC centre. Directorate of education (DOE) MCD, NDMC and DCB have outsourced the mid day meal programme to NGOs and Trusts. These organizations have installed centralized and semi automated kitchens.

On the basis of the field visits and observation by our monitoring team we assess the implementation of the MDM has been reasonably good.

However certain inadequacies have come into sharp focus during our survey. We would like to draw attention towards them so that they could be rectified and program implementation be fine tuned.

1.1 Methodology

The methodology followed is in accordance with the requirements stipulated for monitoring to cover minimum 40 schools in districts. We covered 45 schools in North West Delhi and 42 schools in West Delhi and 5MDM supplierøs kitchen.

As in our monitoring activity, our survey method sought to ensure that there was adequate representation of boys, girls, co-educational schools and aided schools. We have also taken care to include schools administered under different authorities i.e. Directorate of Education, Municipal Corporation and Aided schools.

All gathered data duly certified by Principals/ HOS of schools and MDM Suppliers Kitchen In-charge.

MI representatives collected information through scrutiny of records, interactions, interviews, photographs and observations, available records at different levels include studentøs attendance registers, school level community monitoring register and parents.

Mid day Meal Executive summary of North West Delhi and West Delhi districts.

REGULARITY IN SERVING MEAL:

• Interaction with students and teachers revealed that meals are served fresh to students. Most primary/upper primary schools children covered under Mid-Day-Meal scheme in North West Delhi and West Delhi.

REGULARITY IN DELIVERING FOOD GRAINS :

• Some DOE Mid-day meal suppliers received advance food grains. MCD MDM suppliers received food grains 50days after serving meal in both districts.

REGULARITY IN DELIVERING COOKING COST:

• Suppliers reporting that cooking cost is not received in advance was corroborated by MI own data gathering and observation. In both the districts cooking costs are received about 50 days after serving meals.

QUALITY & QUANTITY OF MEAL :

• It was observed and children reported Meal quality was found to be average and quantity also less than prescribed norms.

SOCIAL EQUITY:

• MI did not observe any cast, gender and community wise discrimination in seating arrangements in classroom and MDM serving and While eating meal among children in any sampled schools of north west Delhi and west Delhi.

Menu display:

- In out of 45 sampled schools in North West Delhi, 12 MCD and one DOE school and out of 42 sampled schools in West Delhi, 11 MCD and 7DOE schools conspicuously displayed MDM weekly menu at noticeable places. No any sampled aided schools displayed weekly MDM menu of both districts.
- Sampled schools teachers and student reported the variety of meals as three rice based meals and three wheat based meals served every week.

Community Mobilization:-

- MI found that Community Member/VKS/PTA is aware of about MDM served in their ward schools. However, out of 87 sampled schools the members were not aware their role and responsibility or eligibility and entitlements of children as notified by the state government in North West Delhi and West Delhi.
- VKS and PTA members reported no training was imparted to the community members for supervision and monitoring of MDMS.
- VKS PTA members informed the MI that school level no community meeting has been held especially for the MDMS.
- In our observation participation of urban local bodies was found inadequate observed in schools with MDMs.

MIS:-

- MI found MDM register was not maintained in any of DOE sampled schools. Out of 24 sampled schools 14 were found maintaining MDM register. No MDM register was available in aided schools while 1 aided school in North west district did not serve MDM.
- No training was imparted to the teachers/principals on maintaining of MDM information and register in DOE and aided schools.

School Health Programme:-

- Most of sampled MCD school teachers informed that MCD Health Department personnel (School Medical Scheme) visited school to check health status of children. No Health Card was available in schools. Directorate and aided schools have not yet implemented school health plan in North West and West Delhi.
- MI observed that children do not wash their hands before meal. But after eating meal children do wash their hands. It was observed double shifted schools have shortage of time to follow this practice.

Status of Cook cum Helpers:-

- MI found cook cum helpers were not engaged as per as the norm of GOI in Northwest and West Delhi schools.
- Mid Day Meal is served in all schools through Centralized kitchen.
- As stipulated the supplier has engages helpers in schools. Remuneration @Re.1/-per child. This however, was not found in all schools across the

board. In schools where the supplier not engaged a helper children themselves serve meals.

• MI observed all helpers belong to weaker sections. Social composition of helpers satisfactory across schools.

Infrastructure:-

• Since Mid Day Meals are served through centralized kitchen in there are no kitchen sheds and kitchen cum stores in any schools.

Staffing:-

- It was observed that no independent staff is engaged at district /zonal level by Directorate of Education and MCD. West zone of MCD has independent School Inspector (SI) for management and supervision of MDMS.
- It was observed that there is no district level task force for DOE and MCD schools in both districts.

Monitoring:-

- It was notice that MDM in-charge monthly meeting called in west zone of MCD.
- While District / zonal level MDM in-charge meeting not called MDM in DOE and aided schools in both districts.
- State level steering monitoring committee meeting has not been held in last six month (1st April 2011 to30th September 2011.)

No discrimination was observed in serving of meals on the basis of caste, gender or

disability. Some children had their meals in the classroom while some ate it while still in queues.

It was observed during MI visits about 50% (12) Sample MCD schools and one school (GSBV Pooth kalan) has displayed weekly menu at conspicuous places in the schools. 19 sampled DOE and aided schools did not displayed weekly menu at conspicuous places.

Menu decided by Mid Day Meal cell in the Directorate of Education and directorate of MCD in consultation with suppliers. About 70% children did not prefer Halwa owing to substandard quality. Mostly children preferred salted black channa.

Meal quality was found to be average. In MI observation the quality of Dal and vegetable was not satisfactory. About 65% of the children reported that the quantity and quality of meal was not sufficient. About 40% Primary school children reported two *puris* were not sufficient for primary children. It was observed that generally two puri serve to class-1 to class -5th children. About 75% of children do not relish *Halwa* salted black gramis more preferred. It ought to be replaced with other wheat based menu. MI observation reveals that the quality of *puris* was not satisfactory; machine-

made puris are hard and some time half cooked and over cooked puri and rice are served. One *puri* weighs 35 to 40 grams depending on the dye of *puri*-making machine.

It was also notice that upper primary school children do not prefer MDMs owing to sub standard quality and taste. Sometimes children carry lunch from home though they also take MDM in school.

State Implementing Cell has prescribed norms for MDM suppliers to provide 200gm wheat based and 250 gm rice based cooked meal per child at primary schools and 250 gm wheat based and 375gm rice based cooked meal per child for upper primary children. It was found that most of MDM in charge not clear how this quantity is to be received from Suppliers in terms of the various food items such as rice *puri, dal* and *sbazi/chhole*. Children and teachers suggested reported Dal / sabjzi/Karhi quality as substandard.

It was observed that the cooks employed by suppliers change frequently. In turn, this affects the quality of meals. Many a time children have to eat over cooked and under cooked meals. Some children and teachers suggested sambher be included in MDM.

Both quantity and quality needs to be improved as also variation in the menu. MI observation reveals that about 30 % DOE upper primary children carry lunch from home and also take MDM. About 90% children like to eat *puri*. MDM supervision requires strengthening at school level. An aided School, Maninder Shakti (keshav puram) has stopped serving Mid day on account of concerns raised by parents on quality of meal.

Field data reveals that sampled 60 %(15) MCD schools have provided Micro nutrients and de-worming tablets to children. MCD Health Department personnel visited schools to check health status of children, Childrenøs Health cards are not maintained in any sampled schools. Directorate of education (DOE) and aided schools children have not yet begun school health plan.

It was found that cook cum helper was not engaged till 30th September 2011 as required by laid down norms of GOI. Mid Day Meals are cooked and served through NGOs and Trusts. MDM supplier has recruited helpers to serve meals in schools. During field visits MI noticed that the suppliers helpers received a remuneration Rs. 600/-per month or Re.1/- per child per school working day. MDM suppliers gave greater opportunity to women belonging to under privileged sections as helpers and cleaners.

It was also observed that helpers engaged by suppliers to serve meal among children in stipulated lunch break were inadequate in numbers for children enrolled in schools. Most of the schools observed that children themselves help the helpers in serving.

There are no kitchen sheds in any schools in Delhi because MDM is provided to children through suppliers appointed by education departments. All suppliers have made centralized Kitchens.



It was found that cook cum helper was not engaged till 30th September 2011 as required by laid down norms of GOI. Mid Day Meals are cooked and served through NGOs and Trusts. 
