

Executive Summary of all the District Reports of MDM

1. Kandhamal District:

- ❖ Hot Cooked meal is served in all sample schools. During 1-4-11 to 30-6-11, only in 03 schools MDM service has been interrupted for a few days.
- ❖ Out of every hundred enrolled children only 55 children are taking MDM because 32 are not coming to school and 13 go home to take home-made food.
- ❖ Food-grains are received regularly by all most all of the schools but some have got 2 to 6 kg less supply of rice per 50 kg. bag.
- ❖ Most of the schools have received 01 month's extra food-grains but only 60 per cent of the schools have received the food-grains at school point. Food-grain quality has been good in all cases.
- ❖ Cooking cost has been received regularly in advance in 32 schools.
- Social equity is seen everywhere relating to cooking, serving and seat arrangement for MDM except Alami PUPS where gender discrimination in seat arrangement is seen.
- ❖ Weekly menu is displayed in 24 schools and 36 schools serve variety of food items as per the prescribed menu.
- Children are happy with both quality and quantity of food items in most of the schools.
- ❖ Healthcare and supplementary nutrient facilities are very rare.
- ❖ Cooks and Helpers do not get remuneration of Rs.1000/- per month. In majority of schools, they belong to weaker sections.
- Pucca kitchen-cum-store has been constructed in many schools but are used either for both cooking and storing purpose in a few schools. No school cooks in open place / school verandah.
- ❖ All schools have potable drinking water facility. Majority of the schools have adequate cooking utensils but none has storing utensils.
- ❖ In most of the schools, children wash hands and utensils before and after eating. They also partake meals in an orderly manner.
- Parents / SMCs / PRI supervise MDM occasionally but a roster for MDM supervision is not maintained.
- Community in many schools has expressed satisfaction over the quantity of MDM served and has felt that MDM contributes to raise child attendance and general health.
- ❖ Inspection visits of MDM officials is very rare.

2. Boudh District:

- ❖ Hot Cooked meal is served in all sample schools. During 11-4-11 to 30-6-11, only in 15 schools MDM service has been interrupted for a few days.
- ❖ Out of every hundred enrolled children only 67 children are taking MDM because 22 are not coming to school and 11 go home to take home-made food.
- ❖ Food-grains are received regularly by most of the schools but some have got 2 to 06 kg less supply of rice per 50 kg. bag.
- ❖ Nearly half of the schools have received 01 month's extra food-grains but most of the schools have received the food-grains at school point. Food-grain quality has been good in almost all cases.
- ❖ Cooking cost has been received regularly in advance in 13 schools.
- Social equity is seen everywhere relating to cooking, serving and seat arrangement for MDM, except Amthapada PUPS where caste discrimination is seen in seat arrangement.
- Weekly menu is displayed in 16 schools. Almost all schools serve variety of food items every day.
- Children are happy with both quality and quantity of food items in almost all schools.
- ❖ Healthcare and supplementary nutrient facilities are very rare.
- Cooks and Helpers do not get remuneration regularly in most of the schools every month. In most of the schools, they belong to weaker sections.
- ❖ Pucca kitchen-cum-store has been constructed in about half of the schools but most of them are not used either for cooking or for storing purpose only. Some schools cook in school verandah and store in classroom.
- Almost all schools have potable drinking water facility. Majority of the schools have adequate cooking utensils but none has storing utensils.
- ❖ In almost all schools, children wash hands and utensils before and after eating. They also partake meals in an orderly manner in all schools.
- Parents / SMCs / PRI supervise MDM occasionally but a roster for MDM supervision is not maintained.
- Community in many schools has expressed satisfaction over the quantity of MDM served and has felt that MDM contributes to raise child attendance and general health.
- ❖ Inspection visits of MDM officials is very rare.

3. Keonjhar District:

- ❖ Hot Cooked meal is served in all sample schools. During 1-4-11 to 30-6-11, only in 08 schools MDM service has been interrupted for a few days.
- Out of every hundred enrolled children, 72 children are taking MDM because 27 are not coming to school and 03 go home to take home-made food.
- ❖ Food-grains are received regularly by majority of the schools but some have got 1 to 05 kg less supply of rice per 50 kg. bag.
- Many schools have received 01 month's extra food-grains and almost all of the schools have received the food-grains at school point. Food-grain quality has been good in almost all schools.
- Cooking cost has never been received in advance regularly. It takes 1 months to 3 months time to get it.
- Social equity is seen everywhere relating to cooking, serving and seat arrangement for MDM.
- ❖ Weekly menu is displayed in 18 schools. Different food items are served everyday in all schools.
- ❖ Children are happy with both quality and quantity of food items in almost all schools.
- ❖ Healthcare and supplementary nutrient facilities are very rare.
- ❖ Cooks and Helpers do not get remuneration of Rs.1000/- per month. In almost all schools, they belong to weaker sections.
- ❖ Pucca kitchen-cum-store has been constructed in 75% of the schools but are not used either for cooking or for storing purpose in most of these schools. Some schools cook in open place / school verandah and store in classroom.
- Most of the schools have potable drinking water facility. Half of the schools have adequate cooking utensils but none has storing utensils.
- ❖ In most of the schools, children wash hands and utensils before and after eating. They also partake meals in an orderly manner in all schools.
- Parents / SMCs/ PRI supervise MDM occasionally but a roster for MDM supervision is not maintained.
- Community in many schools has expressed satisfaction over the quantity of MDM served and has felt that MDM contributes to raise child attendance and general health.
- ❖ Inspection visits of MDM officials is very rare.

4. Mayurbhanj District:

- ❖ Hot Cooked meal is served in all sample schools. During 1-4-11 to MI's visit day, only in 13 schools MDM service has been interrupted for a few days.
- ❖ Out of every hundred enrolled children only 54 children are taking MDM because 38 are not coming to school and 08 go home to take home-made food.
- ❖ Food-grains are received regularly by most of the schools but some have got 1 to 09 kg less supply of rice per 50 kg. bag.
- ❖ Majority of the schools have received 01 month's extra food-grains but most of the schools have received the food-grains at school point. Food-grain quality has been good in all cases.
- ❖ Cooking cost has never been received in advance regularly in any school. It takes even 01 month to 03 months time to get it.
- Social equity is seen in almost all schools relating to cooking, serving and seat arrangement for MDM.
- ❖ Weekly menu is displayed in most of the schools. Different food items are served everyday in all schools.
- Children are happy with both quality and quantity of food items in most of the schools.
- ❖ Healthcare and supplementary nutrient facilities are very rare.
- Cooks and Helpers do not get remuneration regularly in most of the schools every month. In most of schools, they belong to weaker sections.
- ❖ Pucca kitchen-cum-store has been constructed in about 60 per cent of the schools but are not used either for cooking or for storing purpose in most of them. Some schools cook in school verandah and store in classroom.
- ❖ Almost all schools have potable drinking water facility. About half of the schools have adequate cooking utensils but none has storing utensils.
- ❖ In most of the schools, children wash hands and utensils before and after eating and also partake meals in an orderly manner.
- ❖ Parents / SMCs / PRI supervise MDM occasionally but a roster for MDM supervision is not maintained.
- Community in many schools has expressed satisfaction over the quantity of MDM served and has felt that MDM contributes to raise child attendance and general health.
- ❖ Inspection visits of MDM officials is very rare.

KANDHAMAL DISTRICT

Introduction:

Kandhamal District is located in the central region of ODISHA State. It has 2075 number of schools covered under SSA. The District office concerned with MDM scheme is located at Phulbani town. In order to implement MDM activities, District as well as Block level officials have been engaged. Besides, the teachers, SMC members and PRI members are also allowed to supervise the MDM scheme at school level. As per the MDM guidelines, rice is provided to the SHG/SMC who prepares and provides MDM purchasing dal, egg, mealmakers, vegetables and fuel. Each school is to get the cooking cost in advance every month and produce the expenditure statement along with vouchers to the Block office every month for release of the expenditure amount.

Procedure and criteria adopted for selection of sample schools:

As per the MoU and ToR, 40 schools have been identified in discussion with the DPO staffs of Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan of the District on 27-6-11 for monitoring of MDM activities at school level. The guidelines mentioned in the ToR have been followed for school selection. The 40 schools include 8 urban schools and 32 rural schools. The school wise details of criteria basing upon which the sample schools have been identified have been reflected in the DPO's letter no. 5526 dtd. 27-6-2011 placed at page 16. Out of the 40 sample schools, 16 are primary schools (PS) and the rest upper primary schools (UPS). Each of the 40 sample schools has been visited by 01 of the members of the monitoring team who has spent 01 full day at the school to collect the MDM related data as per the format prescribed by the MHRD, GoI. The Nodal Officer has also visited one-third of the 40 sample schools as per the ToR. The data have been obtained by interacting with children, teachers, cook, helper, SHG/ SMC/ NGO providing MDM at school point and by observing the process of MDM preparation, storage and distribution. The data then have been cross-checked, cleaned and tabulated for analysis in respect of different aspects of the MDM scheme.

The MI has visited 40 schools and has found that hot cooked meal is served in every school. In only 03 of these schools since 1-4-11 provision of MDM has been stopped for some days (for school wise details, see Table 1.1 at page18). In Dangulu PUPS, MDM has not been served since 17-6-11 because the villagers have locked the school on strike. In Colonysahi PUPS, MDM service was stopped for operation of class III & V scholarship examination from 18-4-11 to 20-4-11. In Block colony PS, MDM service was stopped on 17-6-11 and 18-6-11 owing to lack of understanding of MDM rules by the SHG. In no school, MDM was stopped due to lack of rice supply,

Many children do not get MDM because they do not come to schools. In some schools, some children who have come to schools also do not take MDM. They go to home to take home made food. In the 40 sample schools, 5543 children have been enrolled and for 5413 children rice is supplied. On the day of MI's visit, 3742 children (67.5%) have attended the school, but 3047 (55.0%) children have actually taken MDM (For school wise details, see Table 2.1 at page19). The main reasons for which children do not come to school need to be explored. The DPO should physically verify the actually enrolled children. Some of the enrolled children have been found, from the Students Attendance Register, to be either long absentees or not coming to school at all since 1-4-11. These may include fake-enrolled or children enrolled in more than one school. A detailed examination of the actually enrolled children, cluster or block-wise, may reduce the percentage of enrolled children not taking MDM because they do not come to school.

The change of diet policy from "same diets everyday" (Bhata and dalma) to "varied diets every day" has been appreciated by children but has not yielded results in narrowing down the percentage gap between the percentage of children attending school and the percentage of children actually availing MDM. The gap has been to 12.5 per cent. However, the gap between the percentage of children availed MDM as per the MDM register and the percentage of children actually availed MDM has become only 2.5 per cent and there is a valid reason behind it. In 21 (52.5%) out of the 40 sample schools (See table 2.1 at page 19 for schoolwise details), in prayer class (at 10 AM) the students are being asked by teachers/ Student Food Minister to raise hands for opting to take MDM on the day and accordingly the MDM food is cooked for only the willing students. Therefore, in these 21 schools, the number of children availed MDM as per the MDM register is same or slightly less than the actual number of children taken MDM. Consequently, no amount of cooked MDM item, has been found to be unconsumed / waste in these 21 schools.

In the other 19 schools, this process is not being practiced, MDM food items are cooked for all those children present in the school as per the attendance register. No body (SMC/SHG/teacher/school cabinet) asks the children whether for any reason any of them is not interested to take MDM on the day. It is presumed that every body is to consume MDM. Consequently, some of the children, although MDM has been cooked for them the school, have been noticed not to eat the MDM food items. The following are the reasons for which children come to school but do not take MDM.

- Children go to home to take food during recess.
- MDM food items are not tasty.
- Children have brought tiffin from home.
- Children have not brought eating utensil (plate) and the schools have no utenils to provide them.

3. REGULARITY IN DELIVERING FOOD GRAINS TO SCHOOL LEVEL:

(i) Is school receiving food grain regularly? If there is delay in delivering food grains, what is the extent of delay and reasons for the same?

School level registers, MDM Registers, Head Teacher, School level MDM functionaries.

Out of the 40 sample schools, 39 schools have received rice regularly since 1-4-11. Information of 01 school is not available, (For school wise details, see Table 3.1 at page 20). Dal, vegetable, mealmaker and eggs are procured from local markets. There is no delay in supply of rice to all these schools, except one.

(ii) Is buffer stock of one-month's requirement is maintained?

School level registers, MDM Registers, Head Teacher, School level MDM functionaries

There is a buffer stock of one month's requirement of rice in 35 out of the 40 sample schools (For school wise details see, Table 3.1).

(iii) Is the quantity of food grains supplied as per the marked / indicated weight?

In 32 out of the 40 sample schools, rice has been supplied less than the marked weight of the bag (i.e. 50kg). Rice has been received less up to 2 to 6 kg. per 50 kg. bag (for schoolwise details see Table 3.1) The Block/ District Officers have not taken appropriate measures to address this problem.

(iv) Is the food grains delivered at the school?

School level registers, MDM Registers, Head Teacher, School level MDM functionaries

Rice is delivered at schools in 24 out of the 40 sample schools. In 16 schools, rice is delivered at SHG house (For school wise details, see Table 3.1).

(v) Is the quality of food grain good?

In all 40 sample schools, the rice received has been of good quality. (For school wise details, see Table 3.2 at page 21).

REGULARITY IN DELIVERING COOKING COST TO SCHOOL LEVEL:

(i) Is school receiving cooking cost in advance regularly? If there is delay in delivering cooking costm what is the extent of delay and reasons for it? School level registers, MDM Registers, Head Teacher, School level MDM functionaries.

32 out of the 40 sample schools have received the cooking cost in advance regularly. The extent of delay of receiving cooking cost for other 08 schools has ranged from 1 to 2 months. The main reasons of such delay have been: (1) delay by Block office to release the cooking cost, (2) MDM bank account has not been opened and (3) lack of allotment (See Table 4.1 at page 22 for school-wise details.)

(ii) In case of delay, how schools manage to ensure that there is no disruption in the feeding programme?

School level registers, MDM Registers, Head Teacher, School level MDM functionaries.

In case of delay, the SHGs have utilized their own fund and the HMs have utilized their own fund; (For school wise details, see Table 4.1 at page 22).

(iii) Is cooking cost paid by Cash or through banking channel?

School level registers, MDM Registers, Head Teacher, School level MDM functionaries.

The cooking cost has been received only through bank (for school wise details, see Table 4.1).

As per the Government of India norms (vide, Lr. F. No. 5-1 / 2010-MDM-2-1 Govt. of India, MHRD, Department of School and Mass Education and Literacy, MDM Division Dt:30-04-2010), 01 cook-cum-helper shall be engaged to a school up to 25 students. 02 cookm-cum-helpers for schools having 26 to 100 students. And 01 additional cook-cum-helper.

This norm is not followed in Orissa. On the other hand, irrespective of the student strength, a school has 01 cook and 01 helper (For school wise details, see Table 9.1 at page _____). However, out of the 40 sample schools, 32 schools have number of cook and helpers as per the GoI norm (For school wise details, see Table 9.1).

(iii)What is remuneration paid to cooks/helpers?

Observations and discussion with children teachers, parents, VEC members, Gram Panchayat members and cooks.

The Cook is paid Rs.600/- per month and the Helper is paid Rs.400/- per month in all sample schools. (For school wise details, see Table 9.1). As per the State Govt's commitment in the 2011 PAB meeting, the Cook/Helper is to get Rs 1000/- per month but this has not been implemented so far.

(iv) Are the remuneration paid to cooks/helpers regularly?

Observations and discussion with children teachers, parents, VEC members, Gram Panchayat members and cooks.

In only 35 out of the 40 sample schools the Cook and Helper have got their remuneration regularly. In other 05 schools, they have got their remunerations with a delay of 02 months (For school wise details, see Table 9.1). As per the current MDM rules of the State, the Cook and Helper are to get their remuneration every month regularly.

(v) Social Composition of cooks /helpers? (SC/ST/OBE/Minority)

Observations and discussion with children teachers, parents, VEC members, Gram Panchayat members and cooks.

In 35 out of the sample 40 schools, the Cook belongs to SC/ ST/ OBC/ minority community. In 30 schools, the Helper belongs to SC/ST/OBC/minority community (For school wise details, see Table 9.1). Thus employment facility is given to the backward communities on priority.

10. INFRASTRUCTURE:

School records, discussion with head teacher, teacher, VEC, Gram Panchayat members.

Out of the 40 sample schools, pucca kitchen shed is not sanctioned for 05 schools. In 04 schools, the pucca kitchen shed-cum-store that has been constructed is in use for both cooking and storing. In 07 schools, it is constructed but is not used for cooking and in 20 schools it is constructed but not in use for storing. In 09 schools, it is under construction whereas in 01 school it is sanctioned but the construction work has not been started (For school wise details, see Table 10.1 at page 28). In 21 out of 25 schools, the pucca kitchen shed cum-store constructed with MDM grant of Rs 60,000/- is not used for cooking or storing or for both.

2. Construction grant received under which scheme?

All the schools who have got the sanction for constructing the kitchen-cum-store have got it under the MDM scheme (For school wise details, see Table 10.1).

3. Reason for not using the constructed kitchen-cum-store for cooking and storing

The constructed kitchen-cum-store is not used for cooking because kitchen has not been handed over to HM (01 school); kitchen lacks door/hearth (02 schools); kitchen is not inaugurated (01 school); or other reasons (02 schools). Further, the same is not used for storing because of space shortage (03 schools), fear of theft (03 schools), and other reasons (04 schools) (For school wise details, see Table 10.1).

In case the pucca kitchen shed is not available, where is the food being cooked and where are the food grains/other ingredients being stored.

Discussion with head teacher, teacher, VEC, Gram Panchayat members, Observation

There are 22 out of the 40 sample schools where pucca kitchen is not used for cooking MDM. Out of these, in 01 school, MDM is cooked in a pucca house of school. In 21 schools, it is cooked in an asbestos / tin / tile roofed house.

There are 35 schools where MDM is not stored in a pucca kitchen-cum-store. In 19 schools, food grains are stored in HM's room / classroom / store room of school/ hostel. Whereas in 16 schools, food grains are stored in SHG house (For school wise details, see Table 10.2 at page 29).

Whether potable water is available for cooking and drinking purpose?

In all 40 sample schools, potable water is available for cooking and drinking purpose (For school wise details, see Table 10.2).

In some schools, they supervise every day whereas in other schools, they supervise occasionally. 2) Any roster maintained by community for supervision of MDM? Roster is not maintained in all 40 sample schools (Table 12.1). 3) (a) opinion of community on quantity of MDM per child at primary level In none of 40 sample schools, the community has opined that the quantity of MDM per child at primary level is poor (For school wise details, see Table 12.2 at page 32).

(b) Opinion of community on quantity of MDM per child at upper primary level.

In none of the 40 sample schools, the community has opined that the quantity of MDM per child at upper primary level is poor (For school wise details, see Table 12.2 at page 32).

(c) Overall impression of MDM programme.

In none of the 40 schools, the overall impression of community on MDM is average (Table 12.2).

(d) From where do you know about MDM.

The community has known about MDM from various sources like TV, Block Official, teacher and school (For school wise details, see Table 12.2).

17. INSPECTION & SUPERVISION

Has the mid day meal programme been inspected by any state/district/block level officers/officials?

School records, discussion with head teacher, teachers, VEC, Gram Panchayat members

In 08 schools the Block level officers have inspected MDM programme. The State level officers and District level officers have visited no school since 1-4-2011 (For school wise details, see Table 13.1 at page 33). In 02 cases, these officers have given written remarks regarding MDM.

18. IMPACT

Has the mid day meal improved the enrollment, attendance of children in school, general well being (nutritional status) of children? Is there any other incidental benefits due to serving cooked meal in schools.

School records, discussion with head teacher, teachers, students, VEC, Gram Panchayat members.

In 37 out of the 40 sample schools, parents, teachers and students have opined that MDM has improved students' enrollment and attendance. In 37 schools they have opined that MDM has improved general health of children. In 28 schools they have opined that MDM has improved nutritional status of children (For school wise details, see Table 14.1 at page 34).

Major Issues:

1. Issue of large number (32.5%) of the enrolled children not coming to school and hence unable to take MDM.

- Many children are either long absentees or have not at all come to school since 1-4-11.
- ➤ The reason may be fake enrollment or enrollment in more than one school.

2. Issues of children (12.5%) denying to take MDM although have attended the school.

- The quantum of such children has been found only in 23 out of the 40 sample schools.
- The reasons are many: (1) children going to home to take food; (2) children not eating owing to lack of utensils; (3) children eating home-made tiffin or snacks purchased from market; and (4) MDM food items are not tasty.

3. Issue of cooked MDM food items not consumed by some (2.5%) children, although MDM has been cooked for them.

- ➤ The quantum of such children has been found only in 17 out of the 40 sample schools.
- ➤ The reason is the lack of attempt to count before cooking MDM, the number of children who would not take MDM and not to cook MDM for them.

4. Issue of not releasing cooking cost in advance regularly

As per the new MDM policy, the State is to release the cooking cost in advance by the first week of every month to the bank account of the SHG/SMC managing the MDM at school level. All SHGs / SMCs managing MDM have therefore been asked to open a separate MDM bank account in March 2011. The State Govt. has also adopted a policy to release the advance cooking cost Rs.10, 000/- or Rs.15, 000/- depending on the students strength of the school. The MI has observed that 08 out of the 40 sample schools have not got this advance regularly every month.

The reasons are: (1) lack of opening of MDM bank account, (2) lack of allotment of grant and (3) delay by the Block Officers to release the cooking cost in advance every month.

5. Issue of managing the fuel cost in primary schools with students enrollment <100.

At present the fuel cost given at primary school level is 22 paise per child per day. When in schools, the students attendance become less, say for instance 50, the actual expenditure against fuel becomes more than the available cooking cost.

- Expenditure on fuel for cooking MDM for 50 children of a Primary School is almost same as that for 50 children of an upper primary school for given number of MDM items. Then why should we pay 22 paise per child per day for primary school and 40 paise per child per day for upper primary school.
- ➤ In many schools, MDM for both primary and upper primary students is cooked together leading to combined fuel expenditure.

6. Issue of engaging Head Teachers in managing MDM

The Head Teachers in some schools are compelled under the following circumstances to procure and manage MDM.

- ➤ BDO/DI of schools verbally instructs the Head Teachers during meetings not to stop provision of MDM at any cost. Written letter in this regard is not circulated. Thus tacitly the MDM rule 6 is violated by the authorities who are supposed to protect it.
- > SMC members take plea that they do not have time to manage MDM but urge that children should get MDM everyday and request the Head Teachers to manage MDM.
- ➤ In the event of delay in payment of advance cooking cost, some SHGs are not willing to manage MDM utilizing their own fund.

7. Less and irregular payment of remuneration to Cook and Helper.

➤ Cooks and Helpers of all schools are paid much less than the Government of India norm and are not regularly paid every month in some schools.

8. Issue of no health check up and no provision of Vit A, iron and de-worming tablets.

➤ Health check up has been done in a very limited schools. Vit. A, iron and de-worming tablets are not given to children.

9. Issue of no use of pucca kitchen shed-cum-store.

There are 25 schools where pucca kitchen shed-cum-store has been constructed under the MDM scheme but in 21 of them, it is not used either for cooking or for storing or for both purposes. The reasons are varied from school to school but the main two of them are space shortage and fear of theft.

10. Issue of inadequate availability of cooking utensils.

➤ One fourth of the sample schools face difficulty in cooking and serving MDM due to inadequate availability of cooking utensils.

11. Issue of lack of supervision and monitoring of MDM

The management of MDM is not properly monitored and supervised by the concerned officers at all levels and this has yielded gross mismanagement of MDM. Food grains are supplied less than the weighted amount. Food grains are not timely supplied. MDM is not consumed by many children. The constructed pucca kitchen shed-cum-store is not utilized for cooking and storing. Cook and Helper do not receive their remuneration regularly every month. Cooking cost advance is not released to some schools regularly every month.

12. Issue of lack of proper weighing system for measuring the weight of food grains and vegetables and the weight of children.

➤ In none of the 40 sample schools, weight of children is measured to know their nutritional status. Similarly, the weight of food grains and vegetables is not accurately measured. It is roughly assessed.

13. Issue of supply of rice 2 to 6 kg. less per each 50 kg bag of rice.

➤ In 32 out of 40 sample schools, this issue has been noticed. But SHG / SMC are forced to sign on the receipt to have got 50 kg. of rice in each bag by the rice supplier at school / SHG point.

Suggestions:

- 1. Rice stock availability at school be recorded every month and accordingly the required amount of rice be supplied with only 01 month of buffer stock.
- 2. Physical verification of the enrolled children at every school be made and the cases of fake/multiple enrollment be identified and quashed out.
- 3. Eating utensils be made available at each school. MDM food items be made more tasty with provision of more quantum of dal and vegetables per child per day. School gate may be closed during recess hours and children be motivated to eat MDM together with other children. Neat and clean dinning space be provided so that the children will like to eat in a safe place throughout the year. Each school be provided with a pucca dinning hall having vitrified tiled floor, sitting space as per enrollment strength, safe drinking water facility and facility for washing utensils and hands with soap and water.

- **4.** Each school be instructed to identify, at morning prayer class every day, the children who would opt for taking MDM and MDM be cooked only for them.
- 5. The Head Teachers, SHGs and SMCs may be given onsite support relating to timely submission of vouchers and expenditure statement to the Block Office. Adequate supporting staff may be provided to facilitate the Block office in releasing the advance cooking cost regularly by the 1st week of every month.
- 6. Fuel cost for a primary student be made same as that for an upper primary student. Keeping in view, the present market price of firewood, the fuel cost may be revised by the appropriate authority.
- 7. The government officers like BDO/DI/SI of schools may be made accountable for giving any verbal instruction to the Head Teachers not to stop provision of MDM at any cost and thus compelling them to manage MDM.
- **8.** No Head Teacher/ teacher be made accountable for any kind of discrepancy or stoppage in the management or procurement of MDM.
- 9. The roles of SMC, SHG and teachers relating to MDM management be displayed in flex board in a visible place in school for generating awareness as well as transparency of MDM rules.
- 10. Each Cook/ Helper be posted as Cook-cum-Helper and be paid Rs.1000/- per month as remuneration. The Govt. of India norm relating to posting of the number of Cook-cum-Helper as per the student strength of school be adopted soon.
- 11. The State should take steps to cover all elementary schools under the NRHM scheme for regular health check up and provision of vit. A, iron and de-worming tablets to children.
- 12. For each kitchen shed-cum-store, a chimney may be constructed for release of smoke. Shelves may be prepared for storage of food grains and fire wood inside the kitchen shed-cum-store using the maintenance grant. In case of schools having more than 100 children,

- additional grant may be given for construction of 01/02 more pucca kitchen shed-cumstores depending upon the enrollment strength of the school.
- 13. Schools having inadequate cooking utensils may be given some grant to procure the required cooking utensils.
- **14.** The supervision and monitoring system needs to be strengthened with documentation of feedback data received by the supervisory and monitoring officers in prescribed formats.
- 15. Each school may be provided with a digital weighing machine for utilizing it to weigh the food grains/vegetables to be used for cooking and also to take weight measurement of the children to assess their nutritional status.
- 16. Each school may be given a separate grant to purchase steel-made storage bins to keep the food grains in safe custody. This may be released depending upon the enrollment strength of school.
- 17. Each school may be given a separate grant for purchasing eating utensils like steel-made tray and glass for the students as per the enrollment strength of school.
- 18. The SHG/SMC may be instructed to use the digital weighing machine (to be provided by the Govt.) to measure the rice supplied per 50 kg. bag and sign on receipt showing the actual amount of rice received.

BOUDH DISTRICT

Introduction:

Boudh District is located in the central region of ODISHA State. It has 771 number of schools covered under SSA. The District office concerned with MDM scheme is located at Boudh town. In order to implement MDM activities, District as well as Block level officials have been engaged. Besides, the teachers, SMC members and PRI members are also allowed to supervise the MDM scheme at school level. As per the MDM guidelines, rice is provided to the SHG/SMC who prepares and provides MDM purchasing dal, egg, mealmakers, vegetables and fuel. Each school is to get the cooking cost in advance every month and produce the expenditure statement along with vouchers to the Block office every month for release of the expenditure amount.

Procedure and criteria adopted for selection of sample schools:

As per the MoU and ToR, 40 schools have been identified in discussion with the DPO staffs of Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan of the District on 27-6-11 for monitoring of MDM activities at school level. The guidelines mentioned in the ToR have been followed for school selection. The 40 schools include 8 urban schools and 32 rural schools. The school wise details of criteria basing upon which the sample schools have been identified have been reflected in the DPO's letter no. 1592(3)/REMS/11 dtd. 27-6-2011 placed at page 50. Out of the 40 sample schools, 18 are primary schools (PS) and the rest upper primary schools (UPS). Each of the 40 sample schools has been visited by 01 of the members of the monitoring team who has spent 01 full day at the school to collect the MDM related data as per the format prescribed by the MHRD, GoI. The Nodal Officer has also visited one-third of the 40 sample schools as per the ToR. The data have been obtained by interacting with children, teachers, cook, helper, SHG/SMC/NGO providing MDM at school point and by observing the process of MDM preparation, storage and distribution. The data then have been cross-checked, cleaned and tabulated for analysis in respect of different aspects of the MDM scheme.

The MI has visited 40 schools and has found that hot cooked meal is served in every school. In 15 of these schools since 1-4-11 provision of MDM has been stopped for some days (for school wise details, see Table 1.1 at page 52). The reasons for interruption of MDM provision are: (1) lack of dal/ rice, (2) illness of cook, (3) kitchen reparing, and (4) less attendance (For school wise details, see Table 1.1). Due to lack of rice supply, MDM provision was stopped in 10 schools.

Many children do not get MDM because they do not come to schools. In some schools, some children who have come to schools also do not take MDM. They go to home to take home made food. In the 40 sample schools, 5614 children have been enrolled and for 5416 children rice is supplied. On the day of MI's visit, 4363 children (77.7%) have attended the school, but 3776 (67.3%) children have taken MDM (For school wise details, see Table 2.1 at page 53). The main reasons for which children do not come to school need to be explored. The DPO should physically verify the actually enrolled children. Some of the enrolled children have been found, from the Students Attendance Register, to be either long absentees or not coming to school at all since 1-4-11. These may include fake-enrolled or children enrolled in more than one school. A detailed examination of the actually enrolled children, cluster or block-wise, may reduce the percentage of enrolled children not taking MDM because they do not come to school.

The change of diet policy from "same diets everyday" (Bhata and dalma) to "varied, diets every day" has been appreciated by children and hence the MDM consumption rate has become 67.3 per cent. Further, the gap between the percentage of children availed MDM as per the MDM register and the percentage of children actually availed MDM has also become only 2.8 per cent and there is a valid reason behind it. In 27 (67.5%) out of the 40 sample schools (See table 2.1 at page 53 for schoolwise details), in prayer class (at 10 AM) the students are being asked by teachers/ Student Food Minister to raise hands for opting to take MDM on the day and accordingly the MDM food is cooked for only the willing students. Therefore, in these 27 schools, the number of children availed MDM as per the MDM register is same or slightly less than the actual number of children taken MDM. Consequently, no amount of cooked MDM item, has been found to be unconsumed / waste in these 27 schools.

In the other 13 schools, this process is not being practiced, MDM food items are cooked for all those children present in the school as per the attendance register. No body (SMC/SHG/teacher/school cabinet) asks the children whether for any reason any of them is not interested to take MDM on the day. It is presumed that every body is to consume MDM. Consequently, some of the children, although MDM has been cooked for them, have been noticed not to eat the MDM food items. The following are the reasons for which children come to school but do not take MDM.

- Children go to home to take food during recess.
- MDM food items are not tasty.
- Children have brought tiffin from home.
- Children have not brought eating utensil and the schools have no utenils to provide them.

REGULARITY IN DELIVERING FOOD GRAINS TO SCHOOL LEVEL:

(iii) Is school receiving food grain regularly? If there is delay in delivering food grains, what is the extent of delay and reasons for the same?

Out of the 40 sample schools, 37 schools have received rice regularly since 1-4-11. In 03 schools, rice has been received in 15 days to 01 month delay (For school wise details, see Table 3.1 at page 54). Dal, vegetable, mealmaker and eggs are procured from local markets. The delay in supply of rice has been made due to official reasons which need to be further explored.

(iv) Is buffer stock of one-month's requirement is maintained?

School level registers, MDM Registers, Head Teacher, School level MDM functionaries

There is a buffer stock of one month's requirement of rice in 22 out of the 40 sample schools (For school wise details see, Table 3.1). The Block officials have adopted no mechanism to monitor the quantum of availability of buffer stock of rice.

(iii) Is the quantity of food grains supplied as per the marked / indicated weight?

In 29 out of 40 schools, rice has been supplied less than the marked weight of the bag (i.e. 50kg). Rice has been received less up to 2 to 6 kg. per 50 kg. bag (for schoolwise details see Table 3.1) The Block/ District Officers have not taken appropriate measures to address this problem.

(iv) Is the food grains delivered at the school?

Rice is delivered at schools in 30 out of 40 sample schools. In other schools, rice has been delivered at SHG house (For school wise details, see Table 3.1).

(v) Is the quality of food grain good?

In 39 out of 40 sample schools, the rice received has been of good quality. In 01 school, rice gives bad smell (For school wise details, see Table 3.2 at page 55).

REGULARITY IN DELIVERING COOKING COST TO SCHOOL LEVEL:

(iv) Is school receiving cooking cost in advance regularly? If there is delay in delivering cooking costm what is the extent of delay and reasons for it?

School level registers, MDM Registers, Head Teacher, School level MDM functionaries.

Only 13 out of the 40 sample schools have received the cooking cost in advance regularly. The extent of delay of receiving cooking cost has ranged from 1 to 3months. The main reasons of such delay have been: (1) delay by Block office to release the cooking cost, (2) delay in the submission of vouchers and expenditure statement by SMC/SHG to Block Office and (3) delay to open the MDM account by SHG / SMC (See Table 4.1 at page 56 for school-wise details.) The strategy of releasing cooking advance needs improvement. The fuel price payment is not sufficient in case of PS having less than 100 student strength. Same is the case with purchase of eggs.

(v) In case of delay, how schools manage to ensure that there is no disruption in the feeding programme?

In case of delay, the SHGs have utilized their own fund; the HMs have utilized their own fund; and the SMC members have utilized their own fund (For school wise details, see Table 4.1 at page 56). STATUS OF COOKS:

(ii) Who cooks and serves the meal? (Cook/helper appointed by the Department or Self Help Group, or NGO or Contractor) Observations and discussion with children teachers, parents, VEC members, Gram Panchayat members and cooks.

Out of the 40 sample schools, Cook and Helper have been engaged by SHG in 21 schools and in 19 schools by SMC (For school wise details, see Table 9.1 at page 61).

(ii) Is the number of Cooks and Helpers engaged as per Govt. of India norms?

Observations and discussion with children teachers, parents, VEC members, Gram Panchayat members and cooks.

As per the Government of India norms (vide, Lr. F. No. 5-1 / 2010-MDM-2-1 Govt. of India, MHRD, Department of School and Mass Education and Literacy, MDM Division Dt:30-04-2010), 01 cook-cum-helper shall be engaged to a school up to 25 students. 02 cookm-cum-helpers for schools having 26 to 100 students. And 01 additional cook-cum-helper.

This norm is not followed in Orissa. On the other hand, irrespective of the student strength, a school has 01 cook and 01 helper (For school wise details, see Table 9.1 at page 61). Further, out of the 40 sample schools, 29 schools have number of cook and helpers as per the GoI norm (For school wise details, see Table 9.1).

(iii)What is remuneration paid to cooks/helpers?

Observations and discussion with children teachers, parents, VEC members, Gram Panchayat members and cooks.

The Cook is paid Rs.600/- per month and the Helper is paid Rs.400/- per month in all sample schools. (For school wise details, see Table 9.1). As per the State Govt.'s commitment in the 2011 PAB meeting, the Cook/Helper is to get Rs.1000/- per month but this has not been implemented so far.

(iv) Are the remuneration paid to cooks/helpers regularly?

Observations and discussion with children teachers, parents, VEC members, Gram Panchayat members and cooks.

In only 02 schools the Cook and Helper have got their remuneration regularly. In 37 schools, they have got their remunerations with a delay of 2 to 3 months in different schools (For school wise details, see Table 9.1). As per the current MDM rules of the State, the Cook and Helper are to get their remuneration every month regularly.

(v) Social Composition of cooks /helpers? (SC/ST/OBE/Minority)

In 39 out of the sample 40 schools, the Cook belongs to SC/ ST/ OBC/ minority community. In 38 schools, the Helper belongs to SC/ST/OBC/minority community (For school wise details, see Table 9.1). Thus employment facility is given to the backward communities on priority.

Out of the 40 sample schools, pucca kitchen shed is not sanctioned for 08 schools. In 04 schools, the pucca kitchen shed-cum-store that has been constructed is in use for both cooking and storing. In 11 schools, it is constructed but is not used for cooking and in 15 schools it is constructed but not in use for storing. In 06 schools, it is under construction whereas in 01 school it is sanctioned but the construction work has not started (For school wise details, see Table 10.1 at page 62). In 20 out of 24 sample schools, the pucca kitchen shed cum-store constructed with MDM grant of Rs.60,000/- are not used for cooking or storing or for both.

2. Construction grant received under which scheme?

All the schools who have got the sanction for constructing the kitchen-cum-store have got it under the MDM scheme (For school wise details, see Table 10.1).

3. Reason for not using the constructed kitchen-cum-store for cooking and storing

The constructed kitchen-cum-store is not used for cooking because kitchen lacks hearth (02 schools), smoke problem (01 school), space shortage (02 schools), using old kitchen (02 schools), or other reasons (4 schools). Further, the same is not used for storing because of space shortage (05 schools), fear of theft (07 schools), or other reasons (03 schools) (For school wise details, see Table 10.1).

In case the pucca kitchen shed is not available, where is the food being cooked and where are the food grains/other ingredients being stored.

In 04 schools the Block level officers have inspected MDM programme. The State level officers and District level officers have visited no school since 1-4-2011 (For school wise details, see Table 13.1 at page 67). In all cases, these officers have not given any written remarks regarding MDM.

IMPACT

Has the mid day meal improved the enrollment, attendance of children in school, general well being (nutritional status) of children? Is there any other incidental benefits due to serving cooked meal in schools.

School records, discussion with head teacher, teachers, students, VEC, Gram Panchayat members.

In 38 sample schools, parents, teachers and students have opined that MDM has improved students' enrollment and attendance. In 35 schools they have opined that MDM has improved general health of children. In 23 schools they have opined that MDM has improved nutritional status of children (For school wise details, see Table 14.1 at page 68).

Major Issues:

- 1. Issue of non-provision of MDM on working days.
 - Limited only to 15 (37.5%) out of 40 sample schools.
 - Reason is lack of supply of rice to 10 out of 15 schools.
- 2. Issue of large number (22.3%) of the enrolled children not coming to school and hence unable to take MDM.
 - Many children are either long absentees or have not at all come to school since 1-4-11.
 - > The reason may be fake enrollment or enrollment in more than one school.
- 3. Issues of children (10.4%) denying to take MDM although have attended the school.
 - ➤ The quantum of such children has been found only in 15 out of the 40 sample schools.
 - The reasons are many: (1) children going to home to take food; (2) children not eating owing to lack of utensils; (3) children eating home-made tiffin and (4) MDM food items are not tasty.
- 4. Issue of cooked MDM food items not consumed by some (2.8%) children, although MDM has been cooked for them.
 - The quantum of such children has been found only in 13 out of the 40 sample schools.
 - ➤ The reason is the lack of attempt to count before cooking MDM, the number of children who would not take MDM and not to cook MDM for them.

5. Issue of not releasing cooking cost in advance regularly

- As per the new MDM policy, the State is to release the cooking cost in advance by the first week of every month to the bank account of the SHG/SMC managing the MDM at school level. All SHGs / SMCs managing MDM have therefore been asked to open a separate MDM bank account in March 2011. The State Govt. has also adopted a policy to release the advance cooking cost Rs.10, 000/- or Rs.15, 000/- depending on the students strength of the school. The MI has observed that 27 out of the 40 sample schools have not got this advance regularly.
- ➤ The reasons are: (1) delayed or no submission of vouchers and expenditure statement by SHG/SMC to the Block office, (2) delay by the Block Officers to release the cooking cost in advance every month, (3) delayed or no opening of MDM bank account, and (4) allotment not released.

6. Issue of managing the fuel cost in primary schools with students enrollment <100.

- At present the fuel cost given at primary school level is 22 paise per child per day. When in schools, the students attendance become less, say for instance 50, the actual expenditure against fuel becomes more than the available cooking cost.
- Expenditure on fuel for cooking MDM for 50 children of a Primary School is almost same as that for 50 children of an upper primary school for given number of MDM items. Then why should we pay 22 paise per child per day for primary school and 40 paise per child per day for upper primary school.
- ➤ In many schools, MDM for both primary and upper primary students is cooked together leading to a combined fuel expenditure.

7. Issue of engaging Head Teachers in managing MDM

The Head Teachers in some schools are compelled under the following circumstances to procure and manage MDM.

- ➤ BDO/DI of schools verbally instructs the Head Teachers during meetings not to stop provision of MDM at any cost. Written letter in this regard is not circulated. Thus tacitly the MDM rule 6 is violated by the authorities who are supposed to protect it.
- > SMC members take plea that they do not have time to manage MDM but urge that children should get MDM everyday and request the Head Teachers to manage MDM.
- ➤ In the event of delay in payment of advance cooking cost, some SHGs are not willing to manage MDM utilizing their own fund.

8. Less and irregular payment of remuneration to Cook and Helper.

Cooks and Helpers of all schools are paid much less than the Government of India norm and are not regularly paid every month.

9. Issue of no health check up and no provision of Vit A, iron tablets and de-worming tablets.

➤ Health check up has been done is a very limited schools. Vit. A, iron tablets and deworming tablets are not given to children.

10. Issue of no use of pucca kitchen shed-cum-store.

➤ There are 24 schools where pucca kitchen shed-cum-store has been constructed under the MDM scheme but in 20 of them, it is not used either for cooking or for storing or for both purposes. The reasons are varied from school to school but the main three of them are space shortage, fear of theft and smoke problem.

11. Issue of inadequate availability of cooking utensils.

➤ About half of the sample schools face difficulty in cooking and serving MDM due to inadequate availability of cooking utensils.

12. Issue of lack of supervision and monitoring of MDM

The management of MDM is not properly monitored and supervised by the concerned officers at all levels and this has yielded gross mismanagement of MDM. Food grains are supplied less than the weighted amount. Food grains are not timely supplied. MDM is cooked for children who do not eat it. The constructed pucca kitchen shed-cum-store is not utilized for cooking and storing. Cook and Helper do not receive their remuneration regularly every month. Cooking cost advance is not released to school regularly every month.

13. Issue of lack of proper weighing system for measuring the weight of food grains and vegetables and the weight of children.

➤ In none of the 40 sample schools, weight of children is measured to know their nutritional status. Similarly, the weight of food grains and vegetables is not accurately measured. It is roughly assessed.

14. Issue of supply of rie 02 to 06 kg. less per each 50 kg. bag of rice.

➤ In 29 schools this issue is marked and the SHG/SMC are compelled to sign on receipt to have received 50 kg. of rice per bag by the rice supplier at school / SHG point.

Suggestions:

- 1. Rice stock availability at school be recorded every month and accordingly the required amount of rice be supplied with only 01 month of buffer stock.
- 2. Physical verification of the enrolled children at every school be made and the cases of fake/multiple enrollment be identified and quashed out.
- 3. Eating utensils be made available at each school. MDM food items be made more tasty with provision of more quantum of dal and vegetables per child per day. School gate may be closed during recess hours and children be motivated to eat MDM together with other children. Neat and clean dinning space be provided so that the children will like to eat in a safe place throughout the year. Each school be provided with a pucca dinning hall having vitrified tiled floor, sitting space as per enrollment strength, safe drinking water facility and facility for washing utensils and hands with soap and water.
- **4.** Each school be instructed to identify, at morning prayer class every day, the children who would opt for taking MDM and MDM be cooked only for them.
- 5. The Head Teachers, SHGs and SMCs may be given onsite support relating to timely submission of vouchers and expenditure statement to the Block Office. Adequate supporting staff may be provided to facilitate the Block office in releasing the advance cooking cost regularly by the 1st week of every month.
- 6. Fuel cost for a primary student be made same as that for an upper primary student. Keeping in view, the present market price of firewood, the fuel cost may be revised by the appropriate authority.
- 7. The government officers like BDO/DI/SI of schools may be made accountable for giving any verbal instruction to the Head Teachers not to stop provision of MDM at any cost and thus compelling them to manage MDM.

- **8.** No Head Teacher/ teacher be made accountable for any kind of discrepancy or stoppage in the management or procurement of MDM.
- **9.** The roles of SMC, SHG and teachers relating to MDM management be displayed in flex board in a visible place in school for generating awareness as well as transparency of MDM rules.
- 10. Each Cook/ Helper be posted as Cook-cum-Helper and be paid Rs.1000/- per month as remuneration. The Govt. of India norm relating to posting of the number of Cook-cum-Helper as per the student strength of school be adopted soon.
- 11. The State should take steps to cover all elementary schools under the NRHM scheme for regular health check up and provision of vit. A, iron and de-worming tablets to children.
- 12. For each kitchen shed-cum-store, a chimney may be constructed for release of smoke. Shelves may be prepared for storage of food grains and fire wood inside the kitchen shed-cum-store using the maintenance grant. In case of schools having more than 100 children, additional grant may be given for construction of 01/02 more pucca kitchen shed-cum-stores depending upon the enrollment strength of the school.
- 13. Schools having inadequate cooking utensils may be given some grant to procure the required cooking utensils.
- **14.** The supervision and monitoring system needs to be strengthened with documentation of feedback data received by the supervisory and monitoring officers in prescribed formats.
- 15. Each school may be provided with a digital weighing machine for utilizing it to weigh the food grains/vegetables to be used for cooking and also to take weight measurement of the children to assess their nutritional status.
- 16. Each school may be given a separate grant to purchase steel-made storage bins to keep the food grains in safe custody. This may be released depending upon the enrollment strength of school.

- 17. Each school may be given a separate grant for purchasing eating utensils like steel-made tray and glass for the students as per the enrollment strength of school.
- 18. The SHG/SMC may be instructed to use the digital weighing machine (to be provided by the Govt.) to measure the rice supplied per 50 kg. bag and sign on receipt showing the actual amount of rice received.

KEONJHAR DISTRICT

Introduction:

Keonjhar District is located in the northen region of ODISHA State. It has 2840 number of schools covered under SSA. The District office concerned with MDM scheme is located at Keonjhar town. In order to implement MDM activities, District as well as Block level officials have been engaged. Besides, the teachers, SMC members and PRI members are also allowed to supervise the MDM scheme at school level. As per the MDM guidelines, rice is provided to the SHG/SMC who prepares and provides MDM purchasing dal, egg, mealmakers, vegetables and fuel. Each school is to get the cooking cost in advance every month and produce the expenditure statement along with vouchers to the Block office every month for release of the expenditure amount.

Procedure and criteria adopted for selection of sample schools:

As per the MoU and ToR, 40 schools have been identified in discussion with the DPO staffs of Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan of the District on 25-7-11 for monitoring of MDM activities at school level. The guidelines mentioned in the ToR have been followed for school selection. The 40 schools include 8 urban schools and 32 rural schools. The school wise details of criteria basing upon which the sample schools have been identified have been reflected in the DPO's letter no. 5485 (13) dtd. 25-7-2011 placed at page 84. Out of the 40 sample schools, 16 are primary schools (PS) and the rest upper primary schools (UPS). Each of the 40 sample schools has been visited by 01 of the members of the monitoring team who has spent 01 full day at the school to collect the MDM related data as per the format prescribed by the MHRD, GoI. The Nodal Officer has also visited one-third of the 40 sample schools as per the ToR. The data have been obtained by interacting with children, teachers, cook, helper, SHG/SMC/NGO providing MDM at school point and by observing the process of MDM preparation, storage and distribution. The data then have been cross-checked, cleaned and tabulated for analysis in respect of different aspects of the MDM scheme.

The MI has visited 40 schools and has found that hot cooked meal is served in every school. In 08 of these schools since 1-4-11 provision of MDM has been stopped for some days (for school wise details, see Table 1.1 at page 86). The reasons for interruption of MDM provision are: (1) lack of rice, (2) prematric scholarship centre, (3) less attendance (For school wise details, see Table 1.1).

Many children do not get MDM because they do not come to schools. In some schools, some children who have come to schools also do not take MDM. They go to home to take home made food. In the 40 sample schools, 7174 children have been enrolled and for 7174 children rice is supplied. On the day of MI's visit, 5364 children (74.8%) have attended the school, but 5052 (70.4%) children have actually taken MDM (For school wise details, see Table 2.1 at page 87). The main reasons for which children do not come to school need to be explored. The DPO should physically verify the actually enrolled children. Some of the enrolled children have been found, from the Students Attendance Register, to be either long absentees or not coming to school at all since 1-4-11. These may include fake-enrolled or children enrolled in more than one school. A detailed examination of the actually enrolled children, cluster or block-wise, may reduce the percentage of enrolled children not taking MDM because they do not come to school.

The change of diet policy from "same diets everyday" (Bhata and dalma) to "varied diets every day" has been appreciated by children and has yielded results in narrowing down the percentage gap between the percentage of children attending school and the percentage of children actually availing MDM. The MDM consumption rate has also increased to 70.4 per cent and the gap has been to only 4.4 per cent. Further, the gap between the percentage of children availed MDM as per the MDM register and the percentage of children actually availed MDM has also became only 1.6 per cent and there is a valid reason behind it. In 26 (65.0%) out of the 40 sample schools (See table 2.1 at page 87 for schoolwise details), in prayer class (at 10 AM) the students are being asked by teachers/ Student Food Minister to raise hands for opting to take MDM on the day and accordingly the MDM food is cooked for only the willing students. Therefore, in these 26 schools, the number of children availed MDM as per the MDM register is same or slightly less than the actual number of children taken MDM. Consequently, no amount of cooked MDM item, has been found to be unconsumed / waste in these 26 schools.

In the other 14 schools, this process is not being practiced, MDM food items are cooked for all those children present in the school as per the attendance register. No body (SMC/SHG/teacher/school cabinet) asks the children whether for any reason any of them is not interested to take MDM on the day. It is presumed that every body is to consume MDM. Consequently, some of the children, although have attended the school, have been noticed not to eat the MDM food items. The reasons have been found as:

- Children go to home to take food (e.g. Bandita Biswal, Class VIII, Baidyarajsahi UGUPS, Keonjhar Munipality (urban) on 1-8-11).
- MDM food items are not tasty or properly cooked (eg, (1) Purnima Nayak, Class IV, Naranpur PS (rural) on 27-7-11 and (2) Ganesh Munda and Laxmi Munda, Class VI, Kabitra NUPS (rural) on 28-7-11).
- Children have brought tiffin from home (eg. (1) Swagat Mohanty and Rakesh Jena, Class VII, Ghatagaon Govt. UPS (rural) on 26-7-11 and (2) Pritisaya Raula, Rupashri Nayak and Tapaswini Sahu, Class VI, Saharpur UGUPS (rural) on 1-8-11).
- Children have not brought eating utensil and the schools have no utenils to provide them (e.g. Santos Mishra and Ranjan Dash, Class VII, Ghatagaon UGUPS (rural), on 26-7-11).
- Children have brought money and have purchased the outside food items during MDM time and consumed (e.g. (i) Sujata Mahanta, Class VI, Palasapanga NUPS (rural) on 29-7-11 and (2) Om Prakash Sahoo, Class IV, Naranpur PS (rural) on 27-7-11).

REGULARITY IN DELIVERING FOOD GRAINS TO SCHOOL LEVEL:

(v) Is school receiving food grain regularly? If there is delay in delivering food grains, what is the extent of delay and reasons for the same?

Out of the 40 sample schools, 26 schools have received rice regularly since 1-4-11. In 14 schools, rice has been received in 02 days to 02 months delay (For school wise details, see Table 3.1 at page 88). Dal, vegetable, mealmaker and eggs are procured from local markets. The delay in supply of rice has been made due to official reasons which need to be further explored.

(vi) Is buffer stock of one-month's requirement is maintained?

School level registers, MDM Registers, Head Teacher, School level MDM functionaries

There is a buffer stock of one month's requirement of rice in 25 out of the 40 sample schools (For school wise details see, Table 3.1). The Block officials have adopted no mechanism to monitor the quantum of availability of buffer stock of rice.

(iii) Is the quantity of food grains supplied as per the marked / indicated weight?

In 33 out of 40 schools, rice has been supplied less than the marked weight of the bag (i.e. 50kg). Rice has been received less up to 1 to 5 kg. per 50 kg. bag (for schoolwise details see Table 3.1) The Block/ District Officers have not taken appropriate measures to address this problem.

(iv) Is the food grains delivered at the school? School level registers, MDM Registers, Head Teacher, School level MDM functionaries

Rice is delivered at schools in 39 out of 40 sample schools. In 01 school, rice is not delivered at school but the school receives it from Block Office (For school wise details, see Table 3.1).

(v) Is the quality of food grain good?

In 39 out of 40 sample schools, the rice received has been of good quality. In 01 school, insects have been found in rice (For school wise details, see Table 3.2 at page 89).

Out of the 40 sample schools, Cook and Helper have been engaged by SHG in 17 schools and in 22 schools by SMC (For school wise details, see Table 9.1 at page 95).

As per the Government of India norms (vide, Lr. F. No. 5-1 / 2010-MDM-2-1 Govt. of India, MHRD, Department of School and Mass Education and Literacy, MDM Division Dt:30-04-2010), 01 cook-cum-helper shall be engaged to a school up to 25 students. 02 cookm-cum-helpers for schools having 26 to 100 students. And 01 additional cook-cum-helper.

This norm is not followed in Orissa. On the other hand, irrespective of the student strength, a school has 01 cook and 01 helper (For school wise details, see Table 9.1 at page 95). However, out of the 40 sample schools, 29 schools have number of cook and helpers as per the GoI norm (For school wise details, see Table 9.1).

(iii)What is remuneration paid to cooks/helpers?

The Cook is paid Rs.600/- per month and the Helper is paid Rs.400/- per month in all sample schools. (For school wise details, see Table 9.1). As per the State Govt's commitment in the 2011 PAB meeting, the Cook/Helper is to get Rs 1000/- per month but this has not been implemented so far.

(iv) Are the remuneration paid to cooks/helpers regularly?

Observations and discussion with children teachers, parents, VEC members, Gram Panchayat members and cooks.

In only 04 schools the Cook and Helper have got their remuneration regularly. In other 35 schools, they have got their remunerations with a delay of 1 to 3 months in different schools (For school wise details, see Table 9.1). As per the current MDM rules of the State, the Cook and Helper are to get their remuneration every month regularly.

(v) Social Composition of cooks /helpers? (SC/ST/OBE/Minority)

Observations and discussion with children teachers, parents, VEC members, Gram Panchayat members and cooks.

In 38 out of the sample 40 schools, the Cook belongs to SC/ST/OBC/minority community. In 38 schools, the Helper belongs to SC/ST/OBC/minority community (For school wise details, see Table 9.1). Thus employment facility is given to the backward communities on priority.

Out of the 40 sample schools, pucca kitchen shed is not sanctioned for 06 schools. In 03 schools, the pucca kitchen shed-cum-store that has been constructed is in use for both cooking and storing. In 16 schools, it is constructed but is not used for cooking and in 25 schools it is constructed but not in use for storing. In 01 school, it is under construction whereas in 01 school it is sanctioned but the construction work has not started (For school wise details, see Table 10.1 at page 96). In 30 out of 33 schools, the pucca kitchen shed cumstore constructed with MDM grant of Rs 60,000/- is not used for cooking or storing or for both.

2. Construction grant received under which scheme?

All the schools who have got the sanction for constructing the kitchen-cum-store have got it under the MDM scheme (For school wise details, see Table 10.1).

3. Reason for not using the constructed kitchen-cum-store for cooking and storing

The constructed kitchen-cum-store is not used for cooking because kitchen has not / recently been handed over to HM (03 schools), no ventilation facility (06 schools), space shortage (02 schools), kitchen distantly located (01 school), or kitchen used as classroom/office/ store (4 schools). Further, the same is not used for storing because of space shortage (05 schools), fear of theft (08 schools), kept KGBV materials (01 school) or using as classroom/office (03 schools) (For school wise details, see Table 10.1).

In case the pucca kitchen shed is not available, Discussion with head teacher, where is the food being cooked and where are the food grains/other ingredients being stored.

There are 24 out of the 40 sample schools where pucca kitchen is not used for cooking MDM. Out of these, in 01 school, MDM is cooked in open place. In 02 schools, it is cooked on school verandah. In 34 schools parents supervise and monitor the MDM. In all 40 sample schools SMC and in 31 schools PRI/ULB supervise and monitor MDM (For school wise details, see Table 12.1 at page 99). In some schools, they supervise every day whereas in other schools, they supervise occasionally.

2) Any roster maintained by community for supervision of MDM?

Roster is not maintained in all 40 sample schools (Table 12.1).

3) (a) opinion of community on quantity of MDM per child at primary level

In none of 40 sample schools, the community has opined that the quantity of MDM per child at primary level is poor (For school wise details, see Table 12.2 at page 100).

(b) Opinion of community on quantity of MDM per child at upper primary level.

In none of the 40 sample schools, the community has opined that the quantity of MDM per child at upper primary level is poor (For school wise details, see Table 12.2 at page 100).

(c) Overall impression of MDM programme.

In none of the 40 schools, the overall impression of community on MDM is average (Table 12.2).

(d) From where do you know about MDM.

The community has known about MDM from various sources like TV, Block Official, newspaper, teacher and AWW (For school wise details, see Table 12.2).

INSPECTION & SUPERVISION

Has the mid day meal programme been inspected by any state/district/block level officers/officials?

In 03 schools the Block level officers have inspected MDM programme. The State level officers and District level officers have visited no school and 04 schools respectively since 1-4-2011 (For school wise details, see Table 13.1 at page 101). In all cases, these officers have not given any written remarks regarding MDM.

IMPACT

Has the mid day meal improved the enrollment, attendance of children in school, general well being (nutritional status) of children? Is there any other incidental benefits due to serving cooked meal in schools.

School records, discussion with head teacher, teachers, students, VEC, Gram Panchayat members.

18.

In all 40 sample schools, parents, teachers and students have opined that MDM has improved students' enrollment and attendance. In 35 schools they have opined that MDM has improved general health of children. In 26 schools they have opined that MDM has improved nutritional status of children (For school wise details, see Table 14.1 at page 102).

Major Issues:

1. Issue of non-provision of MDM on working days.

- ➤ Limited only to 08 (20%) out of 40 sample schools.
- Reason is lack of supply of rice to 06 out of 08 schools.

2. Issue of large number (25.2%) of the enrolled children not coming to school and hence unable to take MDM.

- Many children are either long absentees or have not at all come to school since 1-4-11.
- The reason may be fake enrollment or enrollment in more than one school.

3. Issues of children (4.4%) denying to take MDM although have attended the school.

- The quantum of such children has been found only in 18 out of the 40 sample schools.
- The reasons are many: (1) children going to home to take food; (2) children not eating owing to lack of utensils; (3) children eating home-made tiffin or snacks purchased from market; and (4) MDM food items are not tasty.

4. Issue of cooked MDM food items not consumed by some (1.6%) children, although MDM has been cooked for them.

- The quantum of such children has been found only in 14 out of the 40 sample schools.
- > The reason is the lack of attempt to count before cooking MDM, the number of children who would not take MDM and not to cook MDM for them.

5. Issue of not releasing cooking cost in advance regularly

As per the new MDM policy, the State is to release the cooking cost in advance by the first week of every month to the bank account of the SHG/SMC managing the MDM at school level. All SHGs / SMCs managing MDM have therefore been asked to open a separate MDM bank account in March 2011. The State Govt. has also adopted a policy to release the advance cooking cost Rs.10, 000/- or Rs.15, 000/- depending on the students strength of the school. The MI has observed that 39 out of the 40 sample schools have got this advance once. Only the Jhadeswar NUPS has not received it owing to mistake in opening the MDM account. The other observations are –

No school has got the cooking cost in advance in subsequent months.

➤ The reasons are: (1) delayed or no submission of vouchers and expenditure statement by SHG/SMC to the Block office, and (2) delay by the Block Officers to release the cooking cost in advance every month.

6. Issue of managing the fuel cost in primary schools with students enrollment <100.

- At present the fuel cost given at primary school level is 22 paise per child per day. When in schools, the students attendance become less, say for instance 50, the actual expenditure against fuel becomes more than the available cooking cost.
- Expenditure on fuel for cooking MDM for 50 children of a Primary School is almost same as that for 50 children of an upper primary school for given number of MDM items. Then why should we pay 22 paise per child per day for primary school and 40 paise per child per day for upper primary school.
- > In many schools, MDM for both primary and upper primary students is cooked together leading to a combined fuel expenditure.

7. Issue of engaging Head Teachers in managing MDM

The Head Teachers in some schools are compelled under the following circumstances to procure and manage MDM.

- ➤ BDO/DI of schools verbally instructs the Head Teachers during meetings not to stop provision of MDM at any cost. Written letter in this regard is not circulated. Thus tacitly the MDM rule 6 is violated by the authorities who are supposed to protect it.
- > SMC members take plea that they do not have time to manage MDM but urge that children should get MDM everyday and request the Head Teachers to manage MDM.
- ➤ In the event of delay in payment of advance cooking cost, some SHGs are not willing to manage MDM utilizing their own fund.

8. Less and irregular payment of remuneration to Cook and Helper.

Cooks and Helpers of all schools are paid much less than the Government of India norm and are not regularly paid every month.

9. Issue of no health check up and no provision of Vit A, iron tablets and de-worming tablets.

➤ Health check up has been done is a very limited schools. Vit. A, iron tablets and deworming tablets are not given to children.

10. Issue of no use of pucca kitchen shed-cum-store.

There are 33 schools where pucca kitchen shed-cum-store has been constructed under the MDM scheme but in 30 of them, it is not used either for cooking or for storing or for both purposes. The reasons are varied from school to school but the main three of them are space shortage, fear of theft and smoke problem.

11. Issue of inadequate availability of cooking utensils.

➤ Half of the sample schools face difficulty in cooking and serving MDM due to inadequate availability of cooking utensils.

12. Issue of lack of supervision and monitoring of MDM

The management of MDM is not properly monitored and supervised by the concerned officers at all levels and this has yielded gross mismanagement of MDM. Food grains are supplied less than the weighted amount. Food grains are not timely supplied. MDM is cooked for children who do not eat it. The constructed pucca kitchen shed-cum-store is not utilized for cooking and storing. Cook and Helper do not receive their remuneration regularly every month. Cooking cost advance is not released to school regularly every month.

13. Issue of lack of proper weighing system for measuring the weight of food grains and vegetables and the weight of children.

➤ In none of the 40 sample schools, weight of children is measured to know their nutritional status. Similarly, the weight of food grains and vegetables is not accurately measured. It is roughly assessed.

Suggestions:

- 1. Rice stock availability at school be recorded every month and accordingly the required amount of rice be supplied with only 01 month of buffer stock.
- 2. Physical verification of the enrolled children at every school be made and the cases of fake/multiple enrollment be identified and quashed out.
- 3. Eating utensils be made available at each school. MDM food items be made more tasty with provision of more quantum of dal and vegetables per child per day. School gate may be closed during recess hours and children be motivated to eat MDM together with other

children. Neat and clean dinning space be provided so that the children will like to eat in a safe place throughout the year. Each school be provided with a pucca dinning hall having vitrified tiled floor, sitting space as per enrollment strength, safe drinking water facility and facility for washing utensils and hands with soap and water.

- **4.** Each school be instructed to identify, at morning prayer class every day, the children who would opt for taking MDM and MDM be cooked only for them.
- 5. The Head Teachers, SHGs and SMCs may be given onsite support relating to timely submission of vouchers and expenditure statement to the Block Office. Adequate supporting staff may be provided to facilitate the Block office in releasing the advance cooking cost regularly by the 1st week of every month.
- 6. Fuel cost for a primary student be made same as that for an upper primary student. Keeping in view, the present market price of firewood, the fuel cost may be revised by the appropriate authority.
- 7. The government officers like BDO/DI/SI of schools may be made accountable for giving any verbal instruction to the Head Teachers not to stop provision of MDM at any cost and thus compelling them to manage MDM.
- 8. No Head Teacher/ teacher be made accountable for any kind of discrepancy or stoppage in the management or procurement of MDM.
- 9. The roles of SMC, SHG and teachers relating to MDM management be displayed in flex board in a visible place in school for generating awareness as well as transparency of MDM rules.
- 10. Each Cook/ Helper be posted as Cook-cum-Helper and be paid Rs.1000/- per month as remuneration. The Govt. of India norm relating to posting of the number of Cook-cum-Helper as per the student strength of school be adopted soon.
- 11. The State should take steps to cover all elementary schools under the NRHM scheme for regular health check up and provision of vit. A, iron and de-worming tablets to children.

- 12. For each kitchen shed-cum-store, a chimney may be constructed for release of smoke. Shelves may be prepared for storage of food grains and fire wood inside the kitchen shed-cum-store using the maintenance grant. In case of schools having more than 100 children, additional grant may be given for construction of 01/02 more pucca kitchen shed-cum-stores depending upon the enrollment strength of the school.
- 13. Schools having inadequate cooking utensils may be given some grant to procure the required cooking utensils.
- **14.** The supervision and monitoring system needs to be strengthened with documentation of feedback data received by the supervisory and monitoring officers in prescribed formats.
- 15. Each school may be provided with a digital weighing machine for utilizing it to weigh the food grains/vegetables to be used for cooking and also to take weight measurement of the children to assess their nutritional status.
- 16. Each school may be given a separate grant to purchase steel-made storage bins to keep the food grains in safe custody. This may be released depending upon the enrollment strength of school.
- 17. Each school may be given a separate grant for purchasing eating utensils like steel-made tray and glass for the students as per the enrollment strength of school.

MAYURBHANJ DISTRICT

Introduction:

Mayurbhanj District is located in the northen region of ODISHA State. It has 4988 number of schools covered under SSA. The District office concerned with MDM scheme is located at Baripada town. In order to implement MDM activities, District as well as Block level officials have been engaged. Besides, the teachers, SMC members and PRI members are also allowed to supervise the MDM scheme at school level. As per the MDM guidelines, rice is provided to the SHG/SMC who prepares and provides MDM purchasing dal, egg, mealmakers, vegetables and fuel. Each school is to get cooking cost in advance every month and produce expenditure statement along with vouchers to Block office every month.

Procedure and criteria adopted for selection of sample schools:

As per the MoU and ToR, 40 schools have been identified in discussion with the DPO staffs of Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan of the District on 08-08-2011 for monitoring of MDM activities at school level. The guidelines mentioned in the ToR have been followed for school selection. The 40 schools include 8 urban schools and 32 rural schools. The school wise details of criteria basing upon which the sample schools have been identified have been reflected in the DPO's **letter no. 11295 dtd. 08-08-2011** placed at page 118. Out of the 40 sample schools, 22 are primary schools (PS) and the rest upper primary schools (UPS). Each of the 40 sample schools has been visited by 01 of the members of the monitoring team who has spent 01 full day at the school to collect the MDM related data as per the format prescribed by the MHRD, GoI. The Nodal Officer has also visited one-third of the 40 sample schools as per the ToR. The data have been obtained by interacting with children, teachers, cook, helper, SHG/SMC/NGO providing MDM at school point and by observing the process of MDM preparation, storage and distribution the data then have been cross-checked, cleaned and tabulated for analysis in respect of different aspects of the MDM scheme.

The MI has visited 40 schools and has found that hot cooked meal is served in every school. In 13 of these schools since 1-4-11 provision of MDM has been stopped for some days (for school wise details, see Table 1.1 at page 120). The reasons for interruption of MDM provision are: (1) lack of rice, (2) lack of cooking cost, (3) bad weather and, (4) less attendance (For school wise details, see Table 1.1).

Many children do not get MDM because they do not come to schools. In some schools, some children who have come to schools also do not take MDM. They go to home to take home made food. In the 40 sample schools, 6108 children have been enrolled and for all 6108 children rice is supplied. On the day of MI's visit, 3798 children (62.2%) have attended the school but 3273 (53.6%) children have taken MDM (For school wise details, see Table 2.1 at page 121). The main reasons for which children do not come to school need to be explored. The DPO should physically verify the actually enrolled children. Some of the enrolled children have been found, from the Students Attendance Register, to be either long absentees or not coming to school at all since 1-4-11. These may include fake-enrolled or

children enrolled in more than one school. A detailed examination of the actually enrolled children, cluster or blockwise, may reduce the percentage of enrolled children not taking MDM because they do not come to school.

The change of diet policy from "same diets everyday" (Bhata and dalma) to "Varied diets every day" has been appreciated by children and has yielded results in narrowing down the percentage gap between the percentage of children attending school and the percentage of children actually availing MDM. The gap has become only 8.6 per cent. Further, the gap between the percentage of children availed MDM as per the MDM register and the percentage of children actually availed MDM has also reduced and become 0.5 per cent and there is a valid reason behind it. In 32 (80%) out of the 40 sample schools (See table 2.1 at page 121 for schoolwise details), in prayer class (at 10 AM) the students are being asked by teachers/ Student Food Minister to raise hands for opting to take MDM on the day and accordingly the MDM foodis cooked for only the willing students. Therefore, in these 32 schools, the number of children availed MDM as per the MDM register is same or slightly less than the actual number of children taken MDM. Consequently, no amount of cooked MDM item, has been found to be unconsumed / waste in these 32 schools.

In the other 08 schools, this process is not being practiced. MDM food items are cooked for all those children present in the school as per the attendance register. No body (SMC/SHG/teacher/school cabinet) asks the children whether for any reason any of them is not interested to take MDM on the day. It is presumed that every body is to consume MDM. Consequently, some of the children, although have attended the school, have been noticed not to eat the MDM food items. The reasons have been found as:

- Children go to home to take food (e.g. Susil Kumar Ray, Class II (urban), Arati V.M, PS, Baripada Muniucipality (urban) on 8-8-11).
- MDM food items are not tasty (eg, (1) Nihar Rankan, Class VII, Block Colony UPS (rural) on 8-8-11.
- Children have brought tiffin from home (eg. (1) Samir Kamila and Sudipta Das, Class V, Block Colony UPS, Baripada Block on 8-8-11)
- Children have not brought eating utensil (plates) and the schools have no such utenils to provide them (e.g. Poonama Nayak, and Mousumi Ghose, Class V, Arati V.M. PS (urban) on 8-8-11; Sujata Singh, Class III and Rashmi Priya Singh, Class VI, Sansole PUPS (rural) on 10-8-11; Swarnalata Singh, Class VII, Rangamatia NUPS (rural) on 16-8-11).
- Less amount of of dal is served (e.g. Puja Mohanta, Class VI, Kainfulia UPS (rural) on 8-8-11).

REGULARITY IN DELIVERING FOOD GRAINS TO SCHOOL LEVEL:

(vii) Is school receiving food grain regularly? If there is delay in delivering food grains, what is the extent of delay and reasons for the same? School level registers, MDM Registers, Head Teacher, School level MDM functionaries.

Out of the 40 sample schools, 24 schools have received rice regularly since 1-4-11. In 16 schools, rice has been received in 03 days to 02 months delay (For school wise details, see Table 3.1 at page 122). Dal, vegetable, mealmaker and eggs are procured from local markets. The delay in supply of rice has been made due to official reasons which need to be further explored.

(viii) Is buffer stock of one-month's requirement is maintained?

School level registers, MDM Registers, Head Teacher, School level MDM functionaries

There is a buffer stock of one month's requirement of rice in 25 out of the 40 sample schools (For school wise details see, Table 3.1). The Block officials have adopted no mechanism to monitor the quantum of availability of buffer stock of rice.

(iii) Is the quantity of food grains supplied as per the marked / indicated weight?

In 31 out of 40 schools, rice has been supplied less than the marked weight of the bag (i.e. 50kg). Rice has been received less up to 1 to 9 kg. per 50 kg. bag (for schoolwise details see Table 3.1) The Block/ District Officers have not taken appropriate measures to address this problem.

(iv) Is the food grains delivered at the school?

School level registers, MDM Registers, Head Teacher, School level MDM functionaries

Rice is delivered at schools in 33 out of 40 sample schools. In 07 schools, rice is not delivered at SHG house (For school wise details, see Table 3.1).

(v) Is the quality of food grain good?

In all 40 sample schools, the rice received has been of good quality. (For school wise details, see Table 3.2 at page 123).

REGULARITY IN DELIVERING COOKING COST TO SCHOOL LEVEL:

School level registers, MDM Registers, Head Teacher, School level MDM functionaries.

(x) Is school receiving cooking cost in advance regularly? If there is delay in delivering cooking costm what is the extent of delay and reasons for it?

None of the 40 sample schools has received the cooking cost in advance regularly. The extent of delay of receiving cooking cost has ranged from 1 to 3months. The main reason of such delay has been: (1) delay by Block office to release the cooking cost, (2) delay in the submission / no submission of vouchers and expenditure statement by the SMC /SHG to Block Office, (3) delay to open the MDM account (See Table 4.1 at page 124 for schoolwise details.) The strategy of releasing cooking advance needs improvement. The fuel price payment is not sufficient in case of PS having less than 100 student strength. Same is the case with purchase of eggs.

This norm is not followed in Orissa. On the other hand, irrespective of the student strength, a school has 01 cook and 01 helper (For school wise details, see Table 9.1 at page 129). However, out of the 40 sample schools, 30 schools have number of cook and helpers as per the GoI norm (For school wise details, see Table 9.1).

(iii)What is remuneration paid to cooks/helpers?

Observations and discussion with children teachers, parents, VEC members, Gram Panchayat members and cooks.

The Cook is paid Rs.600/- per month and the Helper is paid Rs.400/- per month in all sample schools. (For school wise details, see Table 9.1). As per the State Govt's commitment in the 2011 PAB meeting, the Cook/Helper is to get Rs 1000/- per month but this, has not been implemented so far.

(iv) Are the remuneration paid to cooks/helpers regularly?

Observations and discussion with children teachers, parents, VEC members, Gram Panchayat members and cooks.

In only 07 schools the Cook and Helper are paid their remuneration regularly. In other 33 schools, they get their remunerations with a delay of 1 to 3 months in different schools (For school wise details, see Table 9.1). As per the current MDM rules of the State, the Cook and Helper are to get their remuneration every month regularly.

(v)_Social Composition of cooks /helpers? (SC/ST/OBE/Minority)

Observations and discussion with children teachers, parents, VEC members, Gram Panchayat members and cooks.

In 37 out of the sample 40 schools, the Cook belongs to SC/ST/OBC/minority community. In 37 schools, the Helper belongs to SC/ST/OBC/minority community (For school wise details, see Table 9.1). Thus employment facility is given to the backward communities in priority.

Out of the 40 sample schools, pucca kitchen shed is not sanctioned for 10 schools. In 08 schools, the pucca kitchen shed-cum-store that has been constructed is in use for both cooking and storing. In 10 schools, it is constructed but is not used for cooking and in 16 schools it is constructed but not in use for storing. In 01 school, it is under construction; in 01 school, the construction work has been stopped at lintel level since 2009 whereas in 01 school it is sanctioned but the construction work has not started (For school wise details, see Table 10.1 at page 130). In 19 out of 27 schools, the pucca kitchen shed cum-store constructed with MDM grant of Rs 60,000/- is not used for cooking or storing or for both.

2. Construction grant received under which scheme?

All the schools who have got the sanction for constructing the kitchen-cum-store have got it under the MDM scheme (For school wise details, see Table 10.1).

3. Reason for not using the constructed kitchen-cum-store for cooking and storing

The constructed kitchen-cum-store is not used for cooking because kitchen has roof leakage (02 schools), space shortage (01 school), no ventilation facility (01 school), inadequate light (01 school), kitchen is damaged (01 school), hearth making problem (01 school) or kitchen used as KGBV storeroom (01 school). Further, the same is not used for storing because of space shortage (03 schools), fear of theft (05 schools), roof leakage (04 schools) or other reasons (04 schools) (For school wise details, see Table 10.1).

In case the pucca kitchen shed is not available, where is the food being cooked and where are the food grains/other ingredients being stored.

Discussion with head teacher, teacher, VEC, Gram Panchayat members, Observation

There are 23 schools out of the 40 sample schools where pucca kitchen is not used for cooking MDM. Out of these, in 02 schools, MDM is cooked in a pucca house of school. In 03 schools, it is cooked on school verandah. In 01 school, it is cooked in a thatched house whereas 17 schools, it is cooked in an asbestos / tin / tile roofed house.

There are 29 schools where MDM is not stored in a pucca kitchen-cum-store. In 10 schools, food grains are stored in SHG house whereas in 19 schools, food grains are stored in HM's room / classroom / store room of school/ unused room of school (For school wise details, see Table 10.2 at page 131).

In none of the 40 sample schools, the community has opined that the quantity of MDM per child at upper primary level is poor (For school wise details, see Table 12.2 at page 134).

(c) Overall impression of MDM programme.

In none of the 40 schools, the overall impression of community on MDM is average (Table 12.2).

(d) From where do you know about MDM.

The community has known about MDM from various sources like TV, Block Official, newspaper, teacher and CDPO (For school wise details, see Table 12.2).

INSPECTION & SUPERVISION

In 07 schools the Block level officers have inspected MDM programme. The State level officers and District level officers have visited no school and 03 schools respectively since 1-4-2011 (For school wise details, see Table 13.1 at page 135). In 03 schools, these officers have given written remarks regarding MDM.

IMPACT

Has the mid day meal improved the enrollment, attendance of children in school, general well being (nutritional status) of children? Is there any other incidental benefits due to serving cooked meal in schools.

School records, discussion with head teacher, teachers, students, VEC, Gram Panchayat members.

18.

In 37 out of the 40 sample schools, parents, teachers and students have opined that MDM has improved students' enrollment and attendance. In 38 schools they have opined that MDM has improved general health of children. In 28 schools they have opined that MDM has improved nutritional status of children (For school wise details, see Table 14.1 at page 136).

Major Issues:

1. Issue of non-provision of MDM on working days.

- Found in 13 (32.5%) out of the 40 sample schools.
- Reason is lack of supply of rice in 09 schools and lack of cooking cost in 03 schools.

2. Issue of large number (37.8%) of the enrolled children not coming to school and hence unable to take MDM.

- Some children are either long absentees or have not at all come to school since 1-4-11.
- The reason may be fake enrollment or enrollment in more than one school.
- Many children have not come to school due to continuous rainfall.

3. Issues of children (8.6%) not taken MDM although have attended the school

- The quantum such children has been found only in 07 out of the 40 sample schools.
- ➤ The reasons are many: (1) children going to home to take food; (2) children not eating owing to
- Lack of utensils; (3) children eating home-made tiffin and (4) MDM food items are not tasty.

4. Issue of not taken MDM food although it has been cooked for them.

- The quantum of such children has been found only in 14 out of the 40 sample schools.
- ➤ The reason is the lack of attempt to count the number of children who would not take MDM and not to cook MDM for them.

5. Issue of not releasing cooking cost in advance regularly

In the new MDM policy, the State has adopted to release the cooking advance by the first week of every month to the bank account of the SHG/SMC managing the MDM at school level. All SHGs/SMCs managing MDM have therefore been asked to open a separate MDM bank account in March 2011. The State Govt. has also adopted a policy to release the advance cooking cost Rs. 10,000/- or Rs. 15,000/- depending on the students strength of the school. The MI has observed that 38 out of the 40 sample schools have got this advance once. Only the Police Line UPS and the Kenduadiha PS have not received it although they opened the MDM account in April-May, 2011. The other observations are —

➤ Only 01 school (Rainbhol PS) has got the cooking cost in advance in subsequent month.

➤ The reasons are: (1) delayed or no submission of vouchers and expenditure statement by SHG/SMC to the Block office (7 schools) and (2) delay by the Block Officers to release the cooking cost in advance every month (34 schools).

6. Issue of managing the fuel cost in primary schools with students enrollment <100.

At present the fuel cost given at primary school level is 22 paise per child per day. When in schools, the students attendance become less, say for instance 50, the actual expenditure against fuel becomes more than the available cooking cost. Cooking expenditure for 50 children of primary schools is almost same as the cooking expenditure for 50 children of upper primary school for given number of MDM items. Then why should we pay 22 paise per child per day for primary school and 40 paise per child per day for upper primary school. In many schools, MDM for primary and student i.e. 40 paise children is cooked together leading to similar fuel expenditrure.

7. Issue of engaging Head Teachers in managing MDM

The Head Teachers in some schools are compelled under the following ciscumstances to procure and manage MDM.

- ➤ BDO/DI of schools have verbally instructed the Head Teachers during meetings not to stop provision of MDM at any cost. Written letter in this regard is not circulated. Thus the MDM rule 6 is violated by the authorities who are supposed to protect it.
- > SMC members take plea that they do not have time to manage MDM and urge that children should get MDM everyday and request Head Teachers to manage MDM.
- ➤ In the event of delay in payment of advance cooking cost, some SHGs are not willing to manage MDM spending their own fund.

8. Less and irregular payment of remuneration to Cook and Helper.

➤ Cooks and Helpers of all schools are paid much less than the Government of India norm and are not regularly paid every month.

9. Issue of no health check up and no provision of Vit A, iron tablets and deworming tablets.

➤ Health check up has been done in a very limited schools. Vit.A, iron tablets and deworming tablets have been given to children of a very few schools.

10. Issue of no use of pucca kitchen shed-cum-store.

➤ There are 27 schools where pucca kitchen shed-cum-store has been constructed under the MDM scheme but in 19 of them, it is not used either for cooking or for storing or for both purposes. The reasons are varied from school to school but the main four of them are space shortage, fear of theft, no ventilation and roof leakage.

11. Issue of inadequate availability of cooking utensils.

➤ Half of the sample schools face difficulty in cooking and serving MDM due to inadequate availability of cooking utensils.

12. Issue of lack of supervision and monitoring of MDM

The management of MDM is not properly monitored and supervised by the concerned officers at all levels and this has yielded gross mismanagement of MDM. Food grains are supplied less than the weighted amount. Food grains are not timely supplied. MDM is cooked for children who do not eat it. The constructed pucca kitchen shed-cum-store is not utilized for cooking and strong. Cook and Helper do not receive their remuneration regularly every month. Cooking cost advance is not released to school regularly every month.

13. Issue of lack of proper weighing system for measuring the weight of food grains and vegetables and the weight of children.

In none of the 40 sample schools, weight of children is measured to know their nutritional status. Similarly, the weight of food grains and vegetables is not accurately measured. It is roughtly assessed.


Suggestions:

- 1. Rice stock availability at school be recorded every month and accordingly the required amount rice be supplied with only 01 month of buffer stock.
- 2. Physical verification of the enrolled children at every school be made and the cases of fake/multiple enrollment be identified and quashed out.
- 3. Eating utensils be made available at each school. MDM food items be made more tasty with provision of more quantum of dal and vegetables per child per day. School gate be closed

during recess hours and children be motivated to eat MDM together with other children. Neat and clean dinning space be provided so that the children will like to eat in a safe place throughout the year. Each school be provided with a pucca dinning hall having vitrified tile floor, sitting space as per enrollment strength, safe drinking water facility and facility for washing utensils and hands with soap and water.

- **4.** Each school be instructed to identify at morning prayer class every day the children who would opt for taking MDM and MDM be cooked for them.
- 5. The Head Teachers, SHGs and SMCs may be given onsite support relating to timely submission of vouchers and expenditure statement to the Block Office. Adequate supporting staff may be provided to facilitate the Block office in releasing the advance cooking cost regularly by the 1st week of every month.
- **6.** Fuel cost for a primary student be made same as that for an upper primary student. Keeping in view, the present market price of firewood, the fuel cost may be revised by the appropriate authority.
- 7. The government officers like BDO/DI/SI of schools may be made accountable for giving any verbal instruction to the Head Teachers not to stop provision of MDM at any cost and thus compelling them to manage MDM.
- **8.** No Head Teacher/ teacher be made accountable for any kind discrepancy or stoppage in the management or procurement of MDM.
- **9.** The roles of SMC, SHG and teachers relating to MDM management be displayed in flex board in a visible place in school for generating awareness as well as transparency of MDM rules.
- **10.** Each Cook/ Helper be posted as Cook-cum-Helper and be paid Rs.1000/- per month as remuneration.Cook-cum-Helpers be posted as per the Govt. of India norm depending upon the student strength of school.
- 11. The State should take steps to cover all elementary schools under the NRHM scheme for regular health check up and provision of vit.A, iron and de-worning tablets to children.

- 12. For each kitchen shed-cum-store, a chimney may be constructed for release of smoke. Shelves may be prepared for store of food grains and fire wood inside the kitchen shed-cum-store using the maintenance grant. In case of schools having more than 100 children, additional grant may be given for construction of 01/02 more pucca kitchen shed-cum-stores depending upon the enrollment strength of the school.
- 13. Schools having inadequate cooking utensils may be given some grant to procure the required cooking utensils. Grants may also be given to purchase stainless steel storage bins and utensils like plates and glasses.
- **14.** The supervision and monitoring system needs to be strengthened with documentation of feedback data received by the supervisory and monitoring officers in prescribed formants.
- 15. Each school may be provided with a digital weighing machine for utilizing it to weigh the food grains/vegetables to be used for cooking and also to take weight measurement of the children to assess their nutritional status.

Major Issues and Policy Recommendations

Basing upon the findings on MDM activities in the 04 sample Districts, some major issues have been identified and policy measures have been suggested for each district separately in earlier chapters and those have been compiled in this chapter. The major issues have been mentioned in section A and the policy recommendations have been delineated in section B.

Section A

Major Issues:

- 1. *MDM is not provided* to children of upper primary schools of G. Udaygiri Block only of Kandhamal District.
- 2. *MDM provision has been interrupted* in 03 (7.5%), 15 (37.5%), 08 (20%) and 13 (32.5%) out of the 40 sample schools in Kandhamal, Boudh, Keonjhar and Mayurbhanj District respectively.

Lack of rice supply is the reason of MDM interruption in none of the 03 schools of Kandhamal District, in 10 out of the 15 schools of Boudh Dustrict, 06 out of the 08 schools of Keonjhar District and 09 out of the 13 schools of Mayurbhanj District.

- 3. A large number of the enrolled children (32.5% in Kandhamal District, 22.3% in Boudh District, 26.9% in Keonjhar District and 37.8% in Mayurbhanj District) have not come to the school and hence have not taken MDM. Some of them are long absentees or have not at all come to school since 1-4-11. The reason may be fake enrollment or enrollment in more than one school.
- 4. In a good number of schools (23, 15, 18 and 7 out of the 40 sample schools in Kandhamal, Boudh, Keonjhar and Mayurbhanj Districts respectively), some of the children, who have attended the school, have not taken MDM. They constitute 12.5%, 10.4%, 2.7% and 8.1% of the total enrolled children of the 40

sample schools in Kandhamal, Boudh, Keonjhar and Mayurbhanj District respectively.

The main reasons are: (1) children going to home to take food; (2) children not eating owing to lack of utensils; (3) children eating home-made tiffin or snacks purchased from market; and (4) MDM food items are not tasty.

5. In several schools (17, 13, 14 and 14 out of the 40 smaple schools in Kandhamal, Boudh, Keonjhar and Mayurbhanj District respectively), **a few children, for whom MDM has been cooked, have not taken MDM**. They constitute 2.5%, 2.8%, 1.6% and 0.5% of the total enrolled children of the 40 sample schools in Kandhamal, Boudh, Keonjhar and Mayurbhanj District respectively.

This has occurred because in these schools, MDM is cooked for all children who have attended the school. There is no attempt to count, before cooking MDM, the number of children who would not take MDM and not to cook MDM for them. This results in wastage of surplus cooked food materials.

- 6. In all the sample schools, cook and helper have been posted instead of cook-cumhelper. Further, cook is paid Rs. 600/- per month and helper Rs. 400/- per month.

 The GoI norm of posting cook-cum-helper and paying remuneration of Rs.1000/- per month is not followed at any of the sample schools and Districts.
- 7. Cooks and helpers are not paid their remuneration regularly every month in some schools although they have opened their individual accounts in banks.
- 8. Several schools have not received the cooking cost in advance every month since 1-4-11. These include 08, 27, 40 and 39 out of the 40 sample schools in Kandhamal, Boudh, Keonjhar and Mayurbhanj District respectively.

The reasons are: (1) lack of opening of separate bank account for MDM, (2) lack of allotment to the District to release the cooking cost, (3) delayed or no submission of vouchers and expenditure statement of every month by SHG / SMC to the Block office, and (4) delay by the Block Officers to release the cooking cost.

9. The Head Teachers in some schools are compelled to procure and manage MDM which violates the Rule 7 of the MDM management guidelines of the State Government. The findings reveal that they do so under the following

- circumstances and spend from their own pocket especially when they do not get the cooking cost in advance regularly every month.
- ➤ BDO/DI of schools have verbally instructed the Head Teachers during meetings not to stop provision of MDM at any cost. Written letter in this regard is not circulated. Thus the MDM rule 6 is violated by the authorities who are supposed to protect it.
- > SMC members take plea that they do not have time to manage MDM and urge that children should get MDM everyday and request Head Teachers to manage MDM.
- ➤ In the event of delay in payment of advance cooking cost, some SHGs are not willing to manage MDM spending their own fund.
- 10. Health check up has been done in a very limited school that too not on regular basis. Vitamin A and iron tablets and deworming medicines are not given regularly to children of any school. Refractive errors of children have not been assessed and spectacles have not been supplied to children having such errors. None of the sample schools of the 04 Districts is covered under the School Health programme.
- 11. The pucca kitchenshed-cum-store, constructed from the MDM grant of Rs.60,000/-, in many schools (21 out of 25 in Kandhamal District, 30 out of 33 in Keonjhar District, 19 out of 27 in Mayurbhanj District and 20 ot of 24 schools in Boudh District) is not utilized for storing/ cooking / both storing and cooking. The reasons are varied but the main three of them are spae shortage, feat of theft and smoke problem.
- 12. **Several schools** (about half of the 40 sample schools in Mayurbhanj, Keonjhar and Boudh Districts and about one-fourth of the 40 sample schools in Kandhamal District) **face difficulty in cooking and serving MDM due to inadequate availability of cooking utensils**. No school has received any grant for procuring cooking, storing or eating utensils although the MME grant is not fully utilized.
- 13. The SHG / SMC has stated that rice is being cupplied 2 to 6 kg. less per each 50 kg. bag of rice but they are compelled by the supplier to sign on the receipt to have got 50 kg. of rice in each bag at the school / SHG point.

- 14. In none of the 40 sample schools, the weight of food grains and vegetables is accurately measured. It is roughly assessed. The weight of children is also not measured to know their nutritional status and hence the extent of malnutrition prevailing among the children is not calculated in all schools.
- 15. **The management of MDM is very rarely monitored** and supervised by the concerned officers at school level and this has yield mis management of MDM.
- 16. There are a number of primary schools (10 in Kandhamal District, 04 in Keonjhar District and 09 in Boudh District) that have < 50 enrolled students. These schools face difficulty in purchasing the required fuel, for cooking MDM, within the fuel cost they receive @ 22 paise per child per day. They also face difficulty in purchasing the eggs from local market within the egg cost they receive per child per day

Section B

Policy recommendations:

- 1. Rice stock availability at school be recorded every month and accordingly the required amount of rice be supplied with only 01 month of buffer stock.
- 2. Physical verification of the enrolled children at every school be made and the cases of fake/multiple enrollment be identified and quashed out.
- Beating utensils be made available for all children at each school. MDM food items be made more tasty with provision of more quantum of dal and vegetables per child per day. School gate may be closed during recess hours and children be motivated to eat MDM together with other children. Neat and clean dinning space be provided so that the children will like to eat in a safe place throughout the year. Each school be provided with a pucca dinning hall having vitrified tiled floor, sitting space as per enrollment strength, safe drinking water facility and facility for washing utensils and hands with soap and water.

- **4.** Each school be instructed to identify, at morning prayer class every day, the children who would opt for taking MDM and MDM be cooked only for them.
- 5. The Head Teachers, SHGs and SMCs may be given onsite support relating to timely submission of vouchers and expenditure statement to the Block Office. Adequate supporting staff may be engaged to facilitate the Block office in releasing the advance cooking cost regularly by the 1st week of every month.
- 6. Fuel cost for a primary student be made same as that for an upper primary student. Keeping in view, the present market price of firewood, the fuel cost may be revised by the appropriate authority.
- 7. The government officers like BDO/DI/SI of schools may be made accountable for giving any verbal instruction to the Head Teachers not to stop provision of MDM at any cost and thus compelling them to manage MDM.
- **8.** No Head Teacher/ teacher be made accountable for any kind of discrepancy or stoppage in the management or procurement of MDM.
- 9. The roles of SMC, SHG and teachers relating to MDM management be displayed in flex board in a visible place in school for generating awareness as well as transparency of MDM rules.
- 10. Each Cook/ Helper be posted as Cook-cum-Helper and be paid Rs.1000/- per month as remuneration. The Govt. of India norm relating to posting of the number of Cook-cum-Helper as per the student strength of school be adopted soon.
- 11. The State should take steps to cover all elementary schools under the School Health Programme or the NRHM scheme for regular health check up and provision of vit. A, iron and de-worming tablets to children.
- 12. For each kitchen shed-cum-store, a chimney may be constructed for release of smoke. Shelves may be prepared for storage of food grains and fire wood inside the kitchen shed-cum-store using the maintenance grant. In case of schools having more than 100 children, additional grant may be given for construction of 01/02

more pucca kitchen shed-cum-stores depending upon the enrollment strength of the school.

- 13. Schools having inadequate cooking utensils may be given some grant to procure the required cooking utensils.
- **14.** Each school may be given a separate grant for purchasing eating utensils like steelmade tray and glass for the students as per the enrollment strength of school.
- 15. Each school may also be given a grant to purchase steel-made storage bins to keep the food grains in safe custody. This may be released depending upon the enrollment strength of school.
- 16. Each school may be provided with a digital weighing machine for utilizing it to weigh the food grains/vegetables to be used for cooking and also to take weight measurement of the children to assess their nutritional status.
- 17. The SHG/SMC may be instructed to use the digital weighing machine (to be provided by the Govt.) to measure the rice supplied per 50 kg. bag and sign on receipt showing the actual amount of rice received.
- 18. The supervision and monitoring system needs to be strengthened with documentation of feedback data received by the supervisory and monitoring officers in prescribed formats.

MDM Programme has been transferred to S&ME Deptt. from W&CD deptt. vide G.A. Deptt. Notification No. 15564-S-II-RB-1/2011/Gen dt. 12.08.2011. Consequent upon transfer of the programme a lot of steps have been initiated for successful implementation of the programme in the field.

Compliance to the major issues:

- Collector, Kandhamal has been instructed to provide cooked noon meal to the children of 32 no. of Upper Primary schools covering 2367 nos. of students of G. Udayagiri Block vide letter No. 281 dt. 28.9.11 of SPMU. This issue in question was brought to the notice of the Secretary, S&ME Deptt. in the review meeting held on dt. 16.09.11 by the DPC, Kandhamal and instruction was issued immediately.
- All the Collectors were requested to ensure lifting of rice from nearest FCI godown and supply to the school point in each quarter. District Collectors, are being requested to see that rice is available at each school point minimum for a period of one month.
- 3. All the DPCs/ D.I of schools are being requested to verify the enrollment of students in schools through BRCCs/ CRCCs/ S.I of schools on priority and see that there is no fake enrollment or enrollment in more than one school.
- Steps are being taken to provide funds for procurement of eating utensils, storage bin and cooking utensils as per the enrollment strength of school out of MME fund.

Steps are being taken to increase the daily ration cost, ration size (in grams) of different items taking the calorie and protein norms into account. All schools must adhere to the weekly menu as per the revised decentralized guidelines.

- Noted for future guidance. Instructions will be issued to all the Collectors to identify in the morning prayer class every day, the children who would like to take MDM. Accordingly, cooked meal will be prepared for the willing students.
- 6 & 7. It is a fact that GoI norm for engaging cook-cum-helper and paying remuneration of Rs. 1000/- per month has not been followed in the schools. State Govt. is aware of the fact and matter will be placed before the Govt. for necessary orders.

Funds relating to honorarium to cook-cum-helper will be deposited in his bank account by 7th of each month. Release of funds shall be made to the BDO at least 3 months in advance. DPC/ D.I of schools/ S.I. of schools have been requested to ensure this.

- 8. It has been decided to release funds relating to cooking cost, cost of food grains, transportation cost, MME, honorarium to cook-cum-helper to D.I Headquarters at least 3 months in advance. Joint account in the name of Headmaster/ SHG/ SMC/ VEC have been opened in the Banks and funds are released to the aforesaid accounts immediately. In this regard, D.I Hqrs. and BDOs have been instructed to rise to the occasion and do the needful.
- 9. Collectors have been requested to ensure cooking of meals by the SHG. Wherever SHGs are not in a position to do the cooking, SMC or VEC will do the work. In no case, Headmasters or teachers will be involved in cooking, procurement or implementation of the programme. However the Headmasters and teachers should monitor the programme.
- 10. It has been decided to take up the issue of School Health programme at the State level with the Health Deptt. for its effective implementation in the field. Collectors have been requested to ensure regular health check-up of students by the doctors of CHC/PHC. Adequate quantity of micro-nutrients, iron, folic Acid and vitamin-A are also recommended to be provided in convergence with

the NRHM. Steps are being taken to eradicate refractive errors and to provide de-worming tablets wherever it is required.

- Non-completion of kitchen-cum-stores in time is a critical gap in the programme. Collectors have been requested to take up review of the construction of the kitchen-cum-store and ensure full utilization of funds within a definite timeframe vide letter No. 17234 dt. 27.8.2011 of S&ME Deptt. Further, instructions are being issued to utilize the kitchen-cum-store for cooking and storing.
- 12. As in point No. 4.
- 13& 14. Steps are being taken to provide weighing machines at school point to ensure proper receipt of rice & vegetables out of MME funds. Weighing machines have been provided to take weight measurement of the children. In case it is not available in any school, Collectors will be instructed to procure and supply the same.
- Supervision and monitoring of the MDM programme has been strengthened. It is being done through "Samikshya". 5 nos. of parameters exclusively for MDM are added to the list of existing 80 parameters in "Samikshya".
 - a) Regularity in serving meals and adherence to weekly menu.
 - b) Availability of food grains.
 - c) Availability of cooking cost.
 - d) Proper storage of food grains.
 - e) Payment of honorarium to cook and helper for the last month.

In addition to above, Collectors have instructed to engage all the field level officers right from the DPC to Sub-Inspector of schools for rigorous visit of schools to ensure proper implementation of MDM programme. Monthly review meeting on MDM programme at Collector level on a fixed date shall strengthen the monitoring of the programme.

16. Steps are being taken to increase the egg cost as per prevailing market price.
