Part-A: General Information

Introduction:

Government of India launched the scheme of National Programme of nutritional support to primary education also known as **Mid-Day-Meal Programme** on 15th August, 1995 for providing wheat @ 3 kg per student per month (for 10 months in a year) subject to 80% attendance to the children studying in primary classes in government and local body schools. Meanwhile, the apex court also intervened and vide its decission dated 28th November, 2001 the Supreme Court directed that the State Government/Union Territories to implement the Mid-Day-Meal Scheme by providing every child in every Government and Government Assisted primary schools with a prepared Mid-Day-Meal with minimum contents of 450 calories of energy and 8-12 grams of protein each day of school for a minimum of 200 days. Those Governments providing dry rations instead of cooked meals must within 3 months start providing cooked meals in all Government Aided primary schools in all half the districts of the state(in order of poverty) and must within a further period of 3 months extend the provisions of cooked meals to the remaining parts of the state.

Supreme Court further directed that Union of India and the FCI to ensure provision of fair average quality grain for the scheme in time. The State/Union Territories and the FCI are directed to do joint inspection of food grains. If the food grains is found, on joint inspection, not to be of fair average quality, it will be replaced by the FCI prior to lifting".

Like many other states, Punjab could not switch over to cooked meal scheme from the very beginning due to certain reasons inter alia due to paucity of funds involved in the conversion of foodgrains to cooked meal. However, in compliance with the Supreme Court's order dated 28-11-2001, cooked meal was provided to the children of primary classes in one block in every district of Punjab during the year 2002-03. The Govt. of Punjab started providing cooked meal to all the students of primary classes in Govt. schools with effect from September, 2004 and for this purpose, a sum of Rs. 666.00 lacs during the financial year 2004-05 was released to the Deputy Commissioners, who are also the Chairmen of the District level Steering-cum-Monitoring Committee for implementation of this scheme at district level. During the financial year 2005-06, a sum of Rs. 1309.86 lacs was released to the Deputy Commissioners as conversion cost for providing cooked meal to the students in the Government and Government-Aided private schools under the scheme. Subsequently, it was extended to children enrolled under Education Guarantee Scheme (EGS) and Alternative Innovative Education (AIE) centres working under Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan Programme.

Objectives of the Programme:-

The main objectives of the programme are:-

- a) To increase enrolment, retention and to tone up the learning abilities of the beneficiaries, especially of children belonging to poor and down trodden sections of the society;
- b) To provide nutritious meal to the school going children to achieve the goal of sound mind in healthy body;
- c) To promote friendship and feelings of common brotherhood among the children belonging to different caste, colour and creed by providing meals to them together and also to increase their retention in schools.

Part B: Review of the Performance of the scheme during 2018-19

1. Coverage of children and PGI points:

The PAB-MDM has approved 8,56,056 children at primary and 6,25,640 children at upper primary level, out of which 8,17,896 children at primary and 5,62,534 children at upper primary have availed Mid Day Meal on an average basis during the year.

Under "Performance Grading Index' (PGI), the Punjab obtained score of 10 against the weightage of 10 for indicator No. 1.3.7 i.e. "% of elementary school's children taking MDM against target approved in PAB – in Govt. and aided schools". It was observed that there is a significant difference in the proportion of children covered at primary and upper primary level as is evident from 101% coverage at primary level compared to 100% at upper primary level as against PAB-MDM approval. It was also observed that the coverage in primary level is below the State average in districts Gurdaspur (91%) and Patiala (92%) but in upper primary level the coverage is below State's average in 13 districts viz. Barnala, Bathinda, Faridkot, Fatehgarh Sahib, Fazilika, Ferozepur, Hoshiarpur Kapuarthala, Mansa, Moga, Mukatsar, Nawnshr and Taran Taran. The State may be advised to take necessary

corrective measures for increasing the coverage in the above districts up to State's average against PAB approval particularly in above districts..

2. School Working Days:

The PAB-MDM has approved 255 working days both at primary and upper primary level, out of which Mid Day Meal was served on 240 working days (94%) for both primary and upper primary levels. Under 'Performance Grading Index (PGI)', Punjab obtained score of 10 against the weightage of 10 for indicator No. 1.3.8 i.e. "% of days Mid Day Meal served against total working days – Govt. and aided elementary schools".

3. Kitchen cum store:

Central assistance of Rs.11659.00 Lakh during 2006-07 to 2009-10 has been released for construction of 18969 Kitchen-cum-Stores from. The State has constructed all the sanctioned kitchen-cum-Stores.

The State of Punjab has proposed repair for 13503 kitchen-cum-stores with an outlay of Rs 1350.30 lakh which comprises of Rs 810.18. lakh as Central Share and Rs 540.12 Lakh as State share.

The State has not submitted the Schedule of Rates for the repairs of kitchen-cumstores. The State may be advised to submit the Schedule of Rates (SoR) approved by the State Government so as to enable MHRD to release the central assistance.

4. Kitchen Devices (new as well as replacement):

Central assistance of Rs 948.45 lakh has been released towards procurement of 18,969 units of kitchen devices. The State has reported that all the 18,969 units of kitchen devices have been procured. Central Assistance of Rs. 948.45 lakh was further released during 2013-14 and 2018-19 for the replacement of 18,969 units of

kitchen devices, against this the State has replaced Kitchen devices in 18,969 schools.

The State has not proposed replacement of kitchen devices during 2019-20.

5. School Nutrition Gardens:

The State has already set up School Nutrition Gardens (SNGs) in 3,004 schools and work for 1491 SNGs is in progress. The State has proposed to set up SNGs in proposed to develop 5436 kitchen gardens at an estimated expenditure of Rs. 271.80 lakh (@Rs.5000/- per SNG) comprising of Rs. 163.08 lakh Central Share and Rs.108.72 lakh State Share. The proposal may be approved. Howevere, the State may be advised to set up kitchen gardens in all schools.

The Secretary (SE&L) mentioned that the objective of SNGs is to address the malnutrition and micronutrient deficiencies in the school children. She further mentioned that large piece of land is not required for setting up of SNG which may be set up even on roof tops for growing vegetables/fruits in containers. Plants may also be grown in small containers, cans, jars, discarded earthen pots, wooden peti, ceramic sinks, food tins and atta bags etc. where land is not available. The grown whole vegetables, fruits can be consumed. Some of the parts like stem (banana, bottle gourd, pumpkin) leaves (coriander, mint, spinach), flower (pumpkin flower, morringa) can be eaten. The leaves, fruits/vegetables and stems of some plants like bottle gourd (lauki), pumpkin (kaddu) etc. can be consumed. She further advised the State to have convergence with the line department viz. Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Department of Agriculture,/Horticulture, Food & Nutrition Board, State Agriculture Universities etc. for setting up of SNGs. The financial assistance of Rs.5, 000 per school will be provided on sharing basis between Centre and States as per the approved funding pattern. Boundary wall, leveling of the land etc. can taken up in convergence with Mahatma Gandhi Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme (MNREGS) of Ministry of Rural Development. The Master Circular containing the guidelines issued by the Ministry of Rural Development indicating the items admissible for assistance through MNREGS may be given to the States..

6. School Health Programme (RBSK, WIFS, NDD etc.) and Nutrition in convergence with other Ministries:

It was observed that health check up has been carried out for children, out of total enrolment of .children.

Secretary, DoSE&L, enquired about the monitoring mechanism adopted by the State / UT for effective implementation of these programmes. It was informed that regular interaction is held with the State Health Department for deputing Medical Teams for health check up of the students.

7. Tithi Bhojan:

The Concept of "Tithi Bhojan", a community participation programme is being implemented by Punjab State as "Preeti Bhojan" under which parents and teachers associations as well as community together distribute sweets on special occasions such as festivals, anniversaries, birthdays, marriages, and days of national importance etc. Additional items viz. sweets, fruits, puri chole, halwa, sweet rice were served during 2018-19 to 98,880 children in 937 schools at total cost of Rs. 4,92,279.33 in three districts viz. Faridkot, Jallandhar and Mukatsar. In-kind contribution of Rs. 8,61,700 was also received in 53 schools under Priti Bhojan in Jallandhar and Mukatsar districts. It may be emphasized to the State that Tithi

Bhojan is not a substitute to Mid-day Meal and this only supplements or complements Mid-Day Meal.

8. Training of Cook-cum-helpers and other capacity building activities:

State has informed that training has been imparted to all the 42,668 cook-cum-helpers engaged by the State, with the help of 217 Master Trainers who were trained by Food Craft Institute, Hoshiarpur, Akshya Patra, Lecturers form Home Science colleges etc.. The State may provide training to all cook-cum-helpers during 2019-20 through Institutes of Hotel Management, Food Craft Institutes, Home Science Colleges of Agriculture Universities. The expenditure for these activities will be met from MME component.

9. Cooking Competition:

The State has proposed to organize cooking competitions at various levels i.e. Block level, District level and State level in schools for promoting variety menu. Under this, nutritionists will examine the recipes to ensure compliance with nutrition standards as laid down in Mid-Day Meal guidelines, and the judges will also include children because they are the ones for whom the meal is being cooked. The expenditure for these activities will be met from MME component.

10. Supplementary nutritional items (milk, egg etc.):

The State informed that they are providing sweet kheer once in a week on each school day from their own resources in all schools in 22 districts, in addition to the Mid Day Meal.

11. Data Entry on MIS-Web Portal:

MDM-MIS portal captures information on critical indicators of MDMS. The annual data entry module captures master data on availability of kitchen-cum-stores, kitchen devices, no. of cook-cum-helpers engaged, mode of cooking etc. The monthly data entry module captures data on no. of days Mid Day Meal was served; number of meals served, honorarium paid to cook-cum-helpers engaged, no. of children received IFA tablets, no. of children screened under RBSK etc. The State of PunjB has completed 100% Annual data entries. However, the State has not completed 100% Monthly data entries in the MIS portal. The monthly data entries have been made for 18557 (94%) schools on an average .The State is advised to ensure that 100% monthly data entries are made in the MIS portal for all the schools by 31st May, 2019.

12. Status of implementation of Automated Monitoring System:

AMS has been put in place for real time monitoring of MDMS. Data on number of meals served on the particular day and reasons if meals not served is being captured from schools with no cost to school head masters/teachers. Out of 19791 schools, daily data has been reported by 11157 schools (57%) on an average during 2018-19 on Automated Monitoring System. In this regard, email alerts are being sent to all States/UTs on daily basis from NIC server. The State is requested to ensure that daily data is being reported by 100% schools on all school working days. Further the State is also advised to analyze the data and use it for better monitoring of the scheme.

13. Usage of Temples, Gurudwaras, Jails etc.:

The State may be advised to explore the possibility of involving Temples, Gurudwaras, Jails for providing Mid Day Meal

14. Centralized kitchens:

The Centralized kitchens of 2 NGOs are providing mid day meal to 91,491 children studying in 530 Institutes located in six districts as detailed below::

The State may be advised to follow the provisions of National Food Security Act, 2013 and Mid Day Meal Rules, 2015 (as amended vide notification No. G.S.R 310(E) dated 16th April, 2019).

15. Awareness generation activities:

State has informed that following activities have been carried out for awareness generation at a total cost of Rs 4,000./- during 2018-19:

- 33 activities relating to Folk songs and rallies were undertaken in 1724 schools in 4 districts viz. Faridkot, Firozepur, Jallandar and Patiala.
- ii) Videos on Nutrition Enzyme and Hygienic Water in clean glasses were shown in the schools.

The State may be advised to continue the IEC activities during 2019-20 also for generating awareness about Mid Day Meal Scheme by organizing cultural and art

festivals, preparing promotional videos for highlighting the best practices in MDM, publicity through print and visual media.. The expenditure for these activities will be met from MME component

16. Social Audit:

The State proposes to conduct Social Audit in two districts during 2019-20. The State may conduct social audit as per guidelines by effectively using the Social Audit Unit (SAU) set up under MNREGS or any suitable reputed agency. The expenditure for these activities will be met from MME component.

17. Use of LPG:

LPG is used as mode of fuel in all the schools.

18. Meeting of District level Steering cum Monitoring Committee:

As per the information provided by the State, 182 (69%) meetings of District Level Steering cum Monitoring Committee under the chairpersonship of the District collector have taken place against the mandated 264 meetings. The State may advise all the District Collectors to hold monthly meetings District Level Steering-cum-Monitoring Committee regularly.

19. Use of Millets / Coarse grains:

It was mentioned that Ministry of Agriculture had decided to celebrate 2018-19 as 'Year of nutri cereals (Millets)'. Millets may continue to be used this year also. It was suggested that the State to explore the possibilities to introduce millets in Mid Day Meal Scheme.
