- 1. Hot milk (150 ml to pry and 200 ml to upper pry. children) provided daily.

Part-A: General Information

The Mid-Day-Meal-Scheme (MDMS) is implemented in Rajasthan under the administrative control of the School Education Department through the mid-day-meal-Commissionerate.

Mid-Day-Meal (MDM) is provided to all students of Class I to VIII studyingin66341Government and Government aided schools, Special Training Centers (STC) and Madarsas & Maqtabs supported under Samgra Shiksha with the objective to address the most urging problems for the children in India, namely, hunger and education, by:

- i. Improving the nutritional status of children studying in classes I VIII in Government and Government-aided schools, Special Training Centers (STCs) and madrasas &maqtabs supported under Samagra Shiksha.
- ii. Encouraging poor children, belonging to disadvantaged sections, to attend school more regularly and help them concentrate on classroom activities.
- iii. Providing nutritional support to children of elementary stage in droughtaffected areas during summer vacation.

Government of Rajasthan started providing cooked meal to the children in schools under the mid-day-meal-program from July 2002.

In October 2007, the state government started implementing Mid- Day- Meal-Scheme (MDMS) for the students in classes from VI to VIII in educationally backward blocks of Rajasthan. In the same year, the MDMS was made effective and began implemented in all the blocks of Rajasthan state.

In the year 2008, itself the mid-day-meal-menu in Rajasthan also included seasonal fruits once a week along with cooked Mid-Day-Meal (MDM).

The Government of India (GOI) introduced a yearly cooking-conversion-cost revision and enhancement system in the year 2009-10. Since then the GOI and GOR has been increasing this cooking-conversion-cost every year (financial year) @ 7.5% per year. This cost sharing system runs with a ratio of 75%:25% respectively up to year 2015-16. From 2016-17, the New Cost Sharing ratio between Government of India (GOI) and Government of Rajasthan (state) (GOR) 60%:40% respectively. Present Cooking Conversion cost for Class 1 to 5 is Rs 4.97 per child per day and for class 6 to 8 is Rs 7.45.

2. Based on the information provided by the State Government in its AWP&B 2020-21, the performance during 2019-20 (01.04.19 to 31.03.2020) was reviewed. The major issues in implementation during 2019-20 are summarized as under: -

2.0 Coverage of Institutions

Thus all the eligible institutions in the State have been covered under MDMS.

2.1.3 <u>No. of Meals</u>: Difference between No. of meal to be served (Target) Vs. No. of meals served (Achievement)- PY+U PY (Ref*er Table 2.7 of the Analysis Sheet).*

The number of meals to be served during 01.04.19 to 31.03.2020 = 11385.16 Lakh

The number of meals served during 01.04.19 to 31.03.2020= 10229,16lakh (90%)

The number of meals served in Banswara (63%), Hanumangarh (64%), Dungarpur (69%), Dausa (73%), Bundi (86%) and S. Madhopur (86%) are less than the State's average (90%) meals. But Sirohi &Barmer (98%) Ganganagar & Baran (100%), Dholpur (101%) and Karauli (108%) served more than the State average meals. The State may look into the reasons for such a huge inter district variation in the number of meals served.

2.2 FOODGRAINS (PRIMARY + UPPER PRIMARY)

2.2.1 <u>Level of Opening balance as on 01.04.19</u>:(Refer Table 3.2 of the Analysis Sheet).

The opening balance of food grain with the State as on 01.04.2019 was 3605.76 MTs (3 %) of the annual allocation of food grains of 138306.43 MTs. As per MDMS guidelines, one month's buffer stock is to be maintained by the State.

2.2.2 <u>Level of unspent balance as on 31.03.2020</u>: (Refer Table 3.3 of the Analysis Sheet).

The unutilized food grain with the State as on 31.03.2020 was 10587.10 MTs which is 8% of the annual allocation of 138306.43 MTs. As per MDMS guidelines, one month's (10%) buffer stock is to be maintained by the State. However, Hanumangarh had 19% unutilized food grains which is more than average unutilized food grain by the State.

2.2.3 Availability of Food grains: (01.04.19 to 31.03.2020) (Refer Table 3.5 of the Analysis sheet).

The State Government Lifted 127000.42 MTs of food grain from Food Corporation of India. The State had unutilized food grain of3605.76 MTs with it at the beginning of the year. Thus the total availability of food grain with the State was 130606.18 MTs which 94% of the annual allocation of food grains to the State during 2019-20.

2.2.4 <u>Utilization of food grains:</u> (Refer Table 3.7 of the Analysis sheet)

The State utilized 120019.08 MTs (87%) of food grains against the allocation of 138306.43MTs. The Inter-districts variations was observed in Baran (58%) on the lower side and Bundi (96%) on the higher side of State average utilization (87%). The State may look into the reasons for wide variations in the inter district utilization of food grains against the State's average of 87%.

2.2.5 <u>Payment of cost of foodgrains to FCI:</u> (Refer Table 3.9 of the Analysis sheet)

The FCI has submitted bills for Rs.2941.46 lakh during 2019-20 towards cost of food grains. The State has made payment of Rs. 2941.46 lakh (100 %) to FCI.

2.3 COOKING COST (PRIMARY + UPPER PRIMARY)

2.3.1 <u>Level of Opening balance as on 01.04.19:</u> (Refer Table 4.1.1 of the Analysis Sheet)

The State had opening balance of Rs.(-) 3267.63 as on 01.04.2019 which is (-) 5 % of annual allocation of Rs. 61919.79 lakh. Seventeen districts had negative opening balance which indicates delay in the release of funds. Five districts viz. Jaiselmer (43%), Jhunjhunu (37%), Kota (33%), Sirohi (32%), S.Madhopur (26%) and Sikar

(24%) had more than the average opening balance with the State. Negative balance of cooking cost indicates delay in the release of funds to the implementing agencies. Availability of excess cooking cost with five districts indicates improper implementation of the scheme.

2.3.2 <u>Level of closing balance as on 31.03.2020:</u>(Refer Table 4.1.2 of the Analysis Sheet)

The closing balance of Rs.(-)-257.63 lakh of the total cooking cost allocation of Rs. 61919.79 lakh.

2.3.3 Utilization of Cooking cost :(Refer Table 4.5 of the Analysis Sheet).

The State has utilized Rs. 54725.56 lakh (88%) against the allocation of 61919.79lakh till 31.03.2020. The lowest utilization was in Banswara (63%) district and the highest in Dholpur (101%) against the State average of 88%. The State may look into the reasons for such a wide variation in the utilization of cooking cost by various districts.

2.4 Reconciliation of utilization and performance during 2019-20 (1.4.19 to 31.03.2020)

2.4.1 <u>Mismatch in utilization of Food grains vis-à-vis cooking cost:</u> (Refer Table – 5.1 of Analysis Sheet)

Ideally the percentage utilization of cooking costs and food grains should tally with each other. The data furnished in the AWP&B reveals that the level in utilization of cooking cost (88 %) and food grains (87 %).

2.5 <u>Cook-Cum-Helper (PRIMARY + UPPER PRIMARY):</u> (Refer Table – 6.2 of Analysis Sheet).

The State has engaged 109922 cook-cum-helpers (CCH) against PAB approval of 109922. Each CCH is paid honorarium of Rs.1320.00 per month. Thus the State is making additional contribution of Rs.320 per month over and above the minimum mandatory contribution.

The State has incurred an expenditure is Rs. 14936.25 lakh (100%) for payment of honorarium to CCH against the allocation of Rs.14936.25 lakh.

2.6 <u>Utilization of MME</u>(Refer Table – 7.2 of Analysis Sheet)

The annual allocation for MME during 2019-20 is Rs.1329.18 lakh. There was opening balance of Rs. 24.92 lakh with the State on 01.04.2019. Rs 1300.44 lakh were released to the State. Thus the State had total availability of Rs 1325.36.lakh with it during 2019-20 .The State has utilized Rs. 1154.17 lakh (87 %) of the annual allocation.

2.7 <u>Utilization of Transportation Assistance</u>(Refer Table – 8.2 of Analysis Sheet)

The State had opening balance of Rs. 396.23 lakh on 01.04.2019. The annual allocation for Transport Assistance during 2019-20 is Rs 2074.60 lakh. The State had lifted 127000.42 MTs of food grain from FCI during the year. The State is paying transportation charges @ 1500 per MT. Thus, transportation assistance for carrying the food grains to schools is 1905.01 lakh. The State has incurred the expenditure of Rs. 539.85 lakh (26 %) on transportation of food grains from FCI godowns to schools.

2.8 <u>Construction of Kitchen-cum-stores</u> (Reference Table -9.1.3 of Analysis Sheet)

Central assistance of Rs. 47135.85 lakh has been released from 2006-07 to 2009-10 for construction of 77,298 Kitchen-cum-Stores.

MHRD has observed inconsistencies in the data submitted by the State relating to construction of kitchen-cum-stores. The issue was discussed during the PAB-MDM meeting held on 17.02.2017 wherein the State was advised to map constructed kitchen-cum-stores with the schools and submit the final data on the status of kitchen-cum-stores constructed by the State.

The State now informed that on the basis of information furnished by District Education Officers in Rajasthan, 50312 (65%) kitchen-cum-Stores have been constructed. Construction is in progress in 2711 schools. The construction for 4085 kitchen-cum-stores is yet to start. The central assistance of Rs. 32103.13 lakh (68%) has been utilized.

The State had informed PAB-MDM in its meeting held on 17.02.2017 that Rs.38137.56 lakh has been utilized for construction of 61751 kitchen-cum-stores In order to resolve this issue, the State may be advised to reconcile the data furnished by DEOs with the U-DISE data on kitchen-cum-stores.

2.8 A Repair of Kitchen-cum-stores:

The State has not proposed to repair the kitchen-cum-stores.

2.9 Procurement of Kitchen devices (Reference Table -9.2.3 of Analysis sheet)

The central assistance of Rs 4422.40 lakh has been released from 2006-07 to 2013-14 forthe procurement of 88448 units of kitchen devices @ Rs.5,000 per school. The kitchen devices have since been procured for all the schools and central assistance of Rs.4422.40 lakh has since been utilized.

The central assistance of Rs. 1546.95 @ Rs.5,000 per school, was released to the State for the replacement of kitchen devices in 30,939 schools. These kitchen devices for these schools have since been replaced.

4. Fund Flow


Fund released by GOI first arrives in the State exchequer from where funds are released to MDM Department. The funds are allocated to the districts in proportion to


the enrollments and average attendance. The funds are e-transferred by districts to the schools.

6. Capacity Building of Cook-cum-helpers.

No training has been organized during 2019-20 for Cook-cum-helpers. However, State has trained 1580 Master Trainers during 2019-20 from Indian Institute of Hotel Management. The Master Trainers will give training to cook-cum-helpers during 2020-21.

7. Grievance Redressal Mechanism

The mechanism for Grievance Redressal System" is given as under:-

- i) <u>Complaints published in newspaper or aired through Electronic Media</u> are sent to the concerned DEO, Elementary Education for resolving them.
- ii) Complaints Received Through Chief Minister's Office and/or other Offices:

The Secretary ensures compliance of such grievances.

iii) Complaints by an individual in person or by Post:-

Complaints received from an individual taken up on same day.

8. Testing of Meal by accredited labs

127 food sample were got tested from a NABL in Jaipur. All samples were found to meet the norms. The testing of meals is being done two times in a month where the MDM is being prepared by Centralized Kitchens.

9. Community participation:

- Tasting of meal: Before serving MDM to the students, it has been tasted by two persons (Teacher and SMC members). Also a tasting register is being maintained at school level in the schools. Maintenance of roster of parents, community for the presence of at least two parents in the school on each day at the time of serving and tasting of mid day meal.
- ii) Contributions by community under TithiBhojan: The state government has initiated the concept of public participation in the scheme through 'Utsav Bhoj Yojna' under the concept of 'Tithi Bhojan Yojna'. In this scheme, the villagers can provide food and sweets to children on various occasions and utensils for MDM centers.

10. Social Audit:

The two districts Baran and Dungarpur were selected for Social Audit on pilot basis in the financial year 2015-16 by the State Government. The social audit in both the districts has been completed. No Social Audit has been conducted during 2019-20.

12. School Nutrition Gardens:

The State has set up School Nutrition Gardens (SNGs) in 815 schools in convergence with State Agriculture Department, Krishi Vigyan Kendras etc. The setting up of SNGs in 1020 schools is in progress. However, the State has proposed to set up SNGs in 66341 schools during 2020-21.

13. Monitoring through Inspections

During 2019-20, 71,242 inspections were carried out by the District Level Officers, State Level Officers etc. to see the delay in the release of funds; delay in the release of honorarium to cook-cum-helpers; quality of mid day meal, non-display of information

under RTE, non-availability of infrastructure facilities. The prescribed monthly inspections for each officer viz. District Collector/Additional District Collector/Other District Officers, Chief Executive Officer, Zila Parishad/Additional CEO, Zila Parishad/Other officers of Zila Parishad is five: 10 each by SDM/Tehsildar/BDO/Executive Officer, Local Bodies; 20 each by DEO/BEO/Sub Divisional Education Officer.

14. Non-Government Organization (NGO):
