# School Kitchen Gardens- PRACTICAL AIMS

GARDENING	<ol> <li>to create a successful, sustainable garden using organic methods</li> <li>to provide a model of a mixed kitchen garden for the community</li> </ol>
NUTRITION	<ol> <li>to produce food for the school</li> <li>to improve children's diet with garden produce and to improve child's eating habits</li> </ol>
SCHOOL SUBJECTS	to reinforce some areas of the school curriculum (e.g. science, environmental science, home economics)
SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY	to bring together school, children, families and community in a common endeavour

#### **OBJECTIVES OF SCHOOL KITCHEN GARDENS**

- Develop children's understanding of vegetable production
- Raise children's interest in a more varied diet
- Help children learn to produce vegetables
- Produce vegetables appreciated by the community and adapted to local climate
- Give opportunities for children to consume the vegetables they grow
- Encourage children to acquire attitudes of cooperation Collective responsibility, self-esteem, self confidence, motivation and value of work.

#### **ACTION PLAN**

This action Plan is the culmination of the working group meeting held on 6<sup>th</sup> November 2017 comprising the States of Kerala, Punjab, Haryana, Chandigarh and Uttarakhand during the National Workshop on Mid Day Meal Scheme organized at Panjim, Goa from 6-7 November 2017.

The action plan brings together the ideas put forward by the respective states comprising the working group and best practices from those already doing school kitchen gardens

### THE SEVEN AREAS OF THE PROPOSED ACTION PLAN

- Resource Availability
- Educational Impact
- Partnership opportunities/Convergence with other

- Advocacy channels
- Timelines
- Programme Sustainability
- Evaluation

### ACTION PLAN - Resource Availability

- Interested students ,parents and teachers
- Gardening Knowledge and materials
- Ground space or space available in roof tops
- Staff time to follow up with and train students &
  - teachers
- Administrative support
- Watering systems to help keep kitchen gardens going
- Funds

### ACTION PLAN — Resource Availability How to go about it

- Listing the programme as an agenda in the State Level Steering cum Monitoring Committee.
- Data regarding land space available, water supply system, etc will be collected from schools in a prescribed format/profroma
- Selection of schools- As a pilot project, 5 or 10 schools in each block
- Convergence with Department of Agriculture and Department of LSG for finance and technical knowledge.
- Formation of Nature/Eco/Agricultural Clubs in Schools
- Procurement of Seeds/Saplings once the crops are identified
- Training of teachers and students with the help of Department of Agriculture/ Agricultural universities/Research Institutions.

### ACTION PLAN — Educational Impact How does gardening connect with student learning

- Linking the concept of school kitchen gardens with curriculum. Incorporate it as a subject in curriculum
- Bring out a study guide on gardening principles
- One period per week should be dedicated to impart knowledge on gardening.
- Create a searchable database for classroom exercises that teachers and students could use while implementing kitchen gardens
- Create a educator's platform for the interaction of teachers from different schools for exchanging and sharing ideas on the innovative / unique practices in the cultivation of kitchen gardens. State wide contests, festivals, workshops could also be organized.

### ACTION PLAN – Partnership Opportunities

- Develop detailed guidelines on how and whom to associate/partner with in implementing the Scheme
- Rope in students, parents, teachers, PTA/MPTA/SMC members who are interested in gardening. Form a school level committee to oversee the project. Include the local ward councillor
- Prepare a list of local farmers, nutritionists, and experts who could provide guidance and technical expertise.
- Form a committee at the ward/panchayath level comprising village Sarpanch, HMs, representatives of teachers & parents, officers from agricultural department, farmers, nutritionists and experts/scientists from agricultural institutes.

### ACTION PLAN – Advocacy Channels

- Develop a state-wide campaign for promoting school kitchen gardens
- Coin a name for the programme and prepare a slogan for it. Nominations can be invited from students and teachers.
- Give widespread publicity for the programme. Get some media attention and post public service advertisements on print and visual media
- Form garden open house for community
- Blogs could be opened for sharing unique/best practices in kitchen gardening among schools

#### ACTION PLAN - Timelines

- Fix timeline for each activity, i.e. for data collection, completion of talks with other departments/agricultural institutions, formation of school agricultural clubs/other committees, training, etc.
- Work with local school personnel to determine a timeline that works for each school.

### ACTION PLAN - Programme Sustainability

- Ensure partnerships at the State and local level. Use it for requisite funding and for technical assistance.
- On the local level, determine how the kitchen garden will be sustained when school is not in session.
- Develop a plan to sustain the kitchen garden with little or no fund. This will help school authorities continue the programme even if financial resources are not available.

#### **ACTION PLAN – Evaluation**

- Create a standardised evaluation matrix from the State level to make sure everyone is measuring common items.
- Officially define, from the State level, what encompasses a "school kitchen garden".
- Establish a baseline of school kitchen gardening by determining the number of schools having a gardening programme based on the State definition.
- Determine a way to easily collect qualitative and quantitative data. Make the data available for the participants.
- Highlight the programme yearly by bringing out Annual Reports.
- Institute a state level award for kitchen gardening.

### RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE WORKING GROUP ON KITCHEN GARDENS

- In order to share the best/unique practices among various States on school kitchen gardens, MHRD may organize one day regional workshops during April-May every year
- Sufficient funds may be allocated under MME for developing kitchen gardens
- To develop and foster cooperation /interaction among States, mutual/joint visits may be promoted.
